

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# HERITAGE TRAIL VISITOR NUMBERS UP BY 50%

## TRACKS estimates 314,000 visitors this year – 208,000 in 2022

**AS PART OF** *TRACKS***'** ongoing efforts to raise funds for further upgrade and repair



of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail, they collected data over the summer about how the trail is being used by residents and visitors. The response to their survey was fantastic with over 500 individuals taking part and TRACKS would like to say a big thank you to all participants.

The results have now been published in a report available to view at *kinross-tracks.* org.uk.

This information will be invaluable in supporting applications for funding to organisations such as Paths for All to help cover the cost of further works.

As part of the visitor survey, TRACKS carried out spot checks of visitor use of the trail and estimated that it may have received in the region of 314,860 visitors in 2023.

This is a huge increase when compared to the 2014/15 survey which using the same calculation method estimated annual visitor numbers of 208,500.

To help raise funds for the repair work, posts were installed in May displaying the TRACKS donation 'QR' code at the main entrances to the Trail (donations can also be made through the TRACKS website).




A spokesperson told the *Newsletter*, 'We are delighted to announce that we have a good response with £1141 received to date, including a very generous donation from Kinross Road Runners.

'Further donations are badly needed and will be very gratefully received. The total required to complete phase 2 of the upgrade and repair work is currently estimated to be in the region of £195,000.'

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## REDUCED OPENING HOURS FOR RECYCLING CENTRE

AS PART OF THE budget process, Perth and Kinross Council agreed at its meeting in March to savings totalling £0.270m. It did this by making changes to the opening arrangements at six out of the nine household recycling centres in Perth and Kinross.

To achieve this saving, the new arrangements, which will be introduced from 1 October 2023, involve changes to the opening hours and the days in which the recycling centres will be open.

Kinross Recycling Centre will no longer be open on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. The opening time for the centre will be to 9am-4pm with last admittance at 3.45pm.

Council data indicates that usage is lowest on these days nevertheless, the changes, which will be implemented from 1 October, will remain under review.



While it is good news that the the centre will stay open both days at the weekends, the new early closing time of 4pm (last entry

> 3.45pm) is likely to be unpopular with people who have to work during the day

and who are more likely to want to use it in the late afternoon and evenings.

Our local councillors have let us know that they are in talks with council officers to see if there might be some flexibility regarding the opening hours, and have asked for more detailed data about daily usage times.

## RECYCLING OPENING HOURS

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## TIME TO CATCH UP!

CATCH (CLIMATE ACTION THROUGH Community Heating) has been exploring options to move our homes, within Kinross and Milnathort, away from reliance on gas for heating, onto sources which are greener, more sustainable, and offer better and more consistent pricing for residents and businesses.

They have been running this ambitious project for a year and have made excellent progress, focused on the opportunities that a District Heating system can bring. There is now a strong set of solutions, with what looks like encouraging economic viability, gaining from industrial scale plant as opposed to individual domestic kit. Good comparators have been examined, from Denmark and more locally. They have identified and spoken with many potential partners for the scheme and are finally ready to shift from Thinking to Doing.

To support this evolution, CATCH needs more help and people with specific capabilities, ideally local people with a strong vested interest in building and supporting our community.


They are seeking folks with enthusiasm, some time, and skills in the following areas:

- Business models
- Investment case creation
- Contracting
- Company creation possibly a Benefit Society or Community Interest Company
- Marketing and Communications strategy – branding/leaflets/ presentations/website etc

PKC are engaged, as an essential part of the story. The CATCH logic fits with their NetZero strategy. CATCH are working closely with the Kinross-shire Partnership.

Through the autumn, they will be launching a significant survey of households in the towns, seeking to understand what gets in the way of adoption of this plan, housing stock requirements, peak demand needs and likely take up.

They are working to secure funding for commercial grade Feasibility Studies, to



raise the plan credibility prior to embarking on detailed design phases.

It is clear, not least from an investment perspective, that the infrastructure required to deliver a good District Heating system can be secured, but only if there is clear, strong pull from the community. Your voice can make a difference here. This seems something worth working towards.

A spokeperson from CATCH told The *Newsletter*, 'Our motivations and goals are clear. A good overall solution should:

- Offer everybody in Kinross and Milnathort, some 3500 properties, access to reliable, resilient, low-cost heating.
- Save 10,000 tonnes of CO2e emissions each year, reducing the climate burden for future generations
- Use energy from the Loch system, protecting our local heat-stressed nature reserve. Actually, any

- measurable reduction on Loch temperatures would be a success.
- Bring other benefits, beyond heat, to the community making it an even more attractive place to live.
   There are jobs with new business opportunities and potential for funds generated to seed other local common-good projects.

We do need help, to plan the way forward, creating the company structures and investment case, and to organise and knock on doors to surface data for the Community Survey. CATCH is currently an informal association. We need to grow up and become excellent at delivery, purely serving the needs of the Towns.'

Organisers of the new arts venture were thrilled when news came from Buckingham

Palace that the King was to include the new arts exhibition in his tour of Kinross on 15 September.

Members of the organising committee, which includes some of the exhibiting artists, were delighted to be presented to His



Majesty as he viewed their exhibition after he had met with organisers and volunteers at Broke not Broken based in The Beacon at St Paul's Scottish Episcopalian Church. Having signed the Arts @ St Paul's Visitors book the King made a short visit to the church and also went to meet with the people of Kinross who had turned out in large numbers to greet him.

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During the following weekend, a steady stream of visitors poured into the hall at St Paul's where artists Pauline McGee and Kathryn Kirkwood were exhibiting their paintings alongside Tracy Mould from Goosetown Pottery and Gillian Skene from Gillian Skene Jewellery, whilst Artist Blacksmith, Jim Shears was busy shaping metal and creating sparks with his outdoor forge and anvil in the church gardens.

From now on, the Arts @ St Paul's project will see weekend exhibitions staged every fortnight until early December. Opening times are from 10am until 4pm on Saturday and Sunday with a different rotation of artists and makers on show each time.

Chair of the Arts @ St Paul's committee, Anne Taylor, said: 'We've been absolutely blown away by the response from the local community to our new arts venture. Our first weekend has been extremely busy, and we hope visitors will continue to support us in the coming weeks and months. The wonderful thing about Arts @ St Paul's is that we will always have something different for people to see – new artists and makers on rotation so the wide variety of high-quality creativity from Kinross-shire and beyond is always on display.'

## THE BEAT GOES ON

## **Kinross Pupils Drum Up Support From Hawick Pipe Band**

YOUNGSTERS IN KINROSS ARE marching to musical success thanks to a donation of pipe band drums from Borders based Hawick Pipe Band.

Following an online appeal from the Scottish Schools Pipes and Drums Trust (SSPDT) for donations of second-hand drums for newly formed school pipe bands, Hawick Pipe Band offered six snares and a tenor drum to the Kinross Youth Pipes and Drums band.

Jim Beattie of Hawick Pipe Band said: 'We are delighted that the drums are going to a new, young band and that they will encourage other young learners. It is so important to keep both drummers and pipers going, to preserve our musical traditions and to pass on the skills to the next generation. We hope the drums will see the band rise to success.'

The tuition programme, co-funded by the SSPDT and PKC, launched last October with the aim of teaching young people in Kinross to play the pipes and drums. Weekly lessons are provided at Kinross High School and Milnathort, Cleish, Arngask, Kinross, Fossoway, and Portmoak primaries, and have proven to be extremely popular with pupils across all schools.

The programme is managed by the Kinross Youth Pipes and Drums voluntary committee. Stephen Kennedy, Chairperson, commented: 'The programme has really taken off and we now have over 75 pupils taking part in lessons each week. Pupils who are learning the drums have been using practice drum-pads, but many are now ready to progress fur-

ther so we needed to source drums as a matter of urgency. We are so grateful to Hawick Pipe Band for their generous donation, and on behalf of all the pupils involved we thank them most sincerely.'

Mr Kennedy adds: 'The first public performance by pupils took the form of a quartet at the Scottish Schools Pipe Band Championships in March, and we are looking forward to representing Kinross Schools in more competitive and social functions going forward. It is hoped that once pupils leave school they will continue to play and apply to join the local Kinross and District Pipe Band.'

Alexandra Duncan, Chief Executive of SSPDT said 'We were delighted to be able to link Hawick Pipe Band with Kinross Youth Pipes and Drums (KYPD). New pipe band drums can cost up to £800 each so this is a tremendous boost. We are pleased to be working with KYPD to provide the free loan of pipes, practice chanters and practice drum-pads, and to co-fund the programme with PKC. The Trust would welcome partnerships with other Councils and/or directly with schools to boost tuition to meet demand.'

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## **BEFORE THE WATERS RISE**

## South Kinross Flood Protection Scheme Exhibition: Thursday 5 October

KINROSS HAS SUFFERED FROM flooding for a long time, with the first recorded flooding in 1852. You may recall the significant flood events of January 1993, December 2006 and February and August 2020. The main flood risk for Kinross comes from three sources: the South Queich, the Gelly Burn and the Clash Burn.

PKC have now engaged consulting engineers who have undertaken detailed modelling work to understand the risk of flooding in these areas.

The risk of flooding is shown on the map opposite. The blue shading indicates the area that could be affected in a 1 in 200-year flood, which is a much rarer event than the estimated 1 in 50-year flood which we saw in February, 2020.

They say that a wide range of potential options have been looked at in order to manage the flood risk including walls and embankments, dredging, a diversion channel, flood storage and natural flood management.

The proposed scheme is intended to protect properties up to the 1 in 200-year flood event, but remains subject to community consultation, statutory consents and the availability of sufficient funding.


Work on this flood scheme has been delayed for various reasons (they mention high staff turnover, and the need to divert staff resources to respond to other flood events).

However, the Council are now ready to consult with the community. A public exhibition was held in Kinross Parish Church on 28 September and another will be held on Thursday 5 October 2023 from 2pm to 8pm.

This will consist of community drop-in sessions and will provide information on the outline design of the flood scheme, including the proposed flood defence types, alignments, heights and indicative finishes.

Officers from the Council's flooding team and the consulting engineers will be there to answer questions. It is anticipated that representatives from SEPA will be present to provide advice in relation to their flood warning services and flood risk management plans, and the Scottish Flood Forum will be pres-





ent on Thursday 5 October to provide advice on flood protection products.

Comment forms will be available. The proposals will also be available to view online at <a href="https://www.pkc.gov.uk/southkinrossflood-scheme">www.pkc.gov.uk/southkinrossflood-scheme</a>. PKC have been consulting with individual landowners and engaging with key stakeholders.

Following the exhibition, the Council will collate questions and comments and provide a response in a report which will be made publicly available. Where possible, the proposed scheme will be amended to address local concerns. They will then seek to publish the final proposals under the Flood Risk Management (Scotland) Act 2009. Thereafter, they will progress the detailed design, tenders and construction. For more information contact <code>SKinrossFloodScheme@pkc.gov.uk</code>.

**THE LATEST GRANT AWARD** from the Fossoway Community Benefit 'Hydro' Fund will support youth work activity in Fossoway over the new 12 months.

KYTHE (Kinross Youth Enterprise) received a grant of £1,800 towards the costs of delivery youth work outreach activities for 11 to 19 year olds, chiefly during school holiday periods during the year to September 2024.

Sessions delivered largely in Crook of Devon will be a real boost for young people in Fossoway, where limited transport links can be a barrier to accessing youth work activities elsewhere.

The Fossoway and District Community Council receives annual funding of £5,000+ from the Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Society to be applied for community benefit within part or all of the Community Council Area, embracing the communities of Blairingone, Carnbo, Crook of Devon, Drum, Powmill and Rumbling Bridge.

The grant scheme is open to local community groups that may be registered charities, unincorporated associations or non-constituted groups of residents coa-

lescing around a common interest. Applicants must be able to provide evidence of the need for their project and demonstrate community benefit.

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
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
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
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## SWING KING IS IN THE GUINNESS!

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# CIVIC TRUST CONCERNS OVER PIER DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

IN A LETTER TO Planning and Development Management at PKC, the Kinross-shire Civic Trust have stated their concerns about the following planning application: 23/01366/FLL Erection of a ticket office, staff welfare/storage unit, workshop and canopy, Loch Leven Fisheries, Pier Road, Kinross, KY13 8UF.

In their letter they state, 'One of the gateways to the Loch Leven Heritage Trail is in this locality... It is therefore a location of



considerable importance and sensitivity. The proposed ticket office and welfare portacabin are ugly utilitarian structures which do not befit this sensitive location. They suggest that this is a place of low value. It is disappointing that Lochleven Castle is being represented in this way.'

They suggest that if the ticket office has to be served by a portacabin and not in the original office/shop, that it should be moved to a different location.

'We suggest it be positioned on the two most easterly parking spaces... another possibility is that the portacabin could be positioned in the same area as the public toilets and Nature Scot office.'

They say that the 'large dilapidated sign for a previous restaurant and shop' should be removed.

The Trust are querying the accuracy of the site plans with regard to the proposed removal of two trees. They say, 'The only information regarding the trees proposed for removal is some text on drawing 04, which states: *Trees identified for felling: TBG 2.40 Franxinus excelsior (Ash) - showing signs of Chalara Ash Dieback TBG 3.60 Sambucus nigra (Elder)'* 

'No tree survey appears to have taken place... Trust representatives are particularly concerned that drawing 03 appears to have marked a healthy mature Beech for felling instead of the Elder. We do not believe the Elder has been marked on the drawings.'

They go on to state, 'The Trust certainly believes it would be wrong to fell healthy

trees merely to make way for the portacabin when there are so many other siting options available.

The Trust give the following reasons for their objection:

• It is contrary to Policy 1A (Placemaking) of the LDP because the siting of the portacabins will not contribute positively to the quality of the surrounding built

and natural environment.

The design and siting of the development does not respect the character and amenity of the place.

- It is contrary to Policy 1B(b) (Placemaking) of the LDP because the design does not complement its surroundings in terms of appearance.
- It is contrary to Policy 40A (Forestry and Woodland Strategy) of the LDP because, due to lack of evidence and information, it cannot be ascertained that the trees are being protected and managed well. Indeed, a seemingly

healthy, mature Beech tree is at risk of unintentional felling due to an inaccurate drawing.

• It is contrary to Policy 40B (Trees,

Woodland and Development) because, at the time of writing, no tree survey undertaken by a suitably qualified professional has been provided.

Despite the concerns, they go on say, 'If the ticket office is re-sited, this application could be acceptable. The Trust believes it



would be very beneficial for tourism if there were an interpretation centre in the vicinity of the pier giving information about the historical significance of the loch as well as information about its ecological value. This would be valuable particularly in the late autumn and winter months when the ferry to the castle does not operate.'

Kinross Community Council has asked for an extension to the comments deadline, in order to consider its own response.

## AMAZON BESTSELLER FOR ROWAN!

**FOLLOWING THE RECENT** sell-out performance of her new work, *The Witches of Culross* (inspired by the true story of a mother and daughter who were both executed for witchcraft), local author and renowned Scottish storyteller Rowan Morrison will perform an evolved version as part of this year's International Storytelling Festival.

Of those horrors little more now remains than difficult-to-decipher records and the ashes of bones recorded in dry

academic textbooks. Rowan (left) believes this serves to keep the horrors of the persecution of women at arms' length. But as a storyteller, she believes stories live on in hearts and minds.

The story came from research for a collaborative performance at the 2022 Storytelling Festival. Turning the oral performance into a

book required a leap of faith on her part, but The Witches of Culross is now a bestseller on Amazon, available on Kindle, in paperback and in hardback.

Although written in English, Rowan has retained the authentic and incredibly beautiful Scottish vernacular for its limited dialogue. To guide the reader, a dictionary of the Scots and Gaelic words is provided at the back of the book.

As the nights draw in, pour yourself a wee dram and step back in time to the sights, sounds and smells of the cobbled streets of seventeenth-century Culross, and bear witness to this story of intergenerational witch persecution.



**THERE WAS A PALPABLE** air of excitement in Kinross when news broke that His Majesty the King was to visit on Friday 15 September. It has been 62 years since the last Royal Visit, of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip.

The streets were lined with people around St Paul's, his first stop, and also along the High Street, with a genial atmosphere among the crowds.

His Majesty arrived at Kinross House Estate by helicopter and was driven to St Paul's Episcopal Church where he was received by the Lord-Lieutenant Of Perth And Kinross, Mr Stephen Leckie. Here he met the Provost Xander McDade, Deputy Lord Lieutenant Andy Middlemiss and local councillor Willie Robertson.

He then visited our local Foodbank, Broke not Broken. Anyone who has visited or heard them talk about what they do, knows that limiting them to 5-10 minutes was always going to be a challenge. We asked Annie McCormack from Broke not Broken to tell us a bit more about the visit. She was keen to share what happened behind closed doors, for all the community to feel a part of.

Annie greeted the King in the line-up and Clare Slight, a founding co-member of the group, was introduced to him. Annie then attempted to take the King into the foodbank, but he instead detoured over to a crowd that had gathered at the rugby club car park. He chatted with people, children and a gentleman in a mobility scooter.

Once in the foodbank building he met Danielle Ramage, project co-ordinator. He was particularly interested in the isolation and mental health impacts linked to living rurally and when experiencing poverty, as well as how much dignity is put into each food parcel. We talked about the importance of offering supermarket vouchers and the dignity and choice that gives back to people. Danielle talked about the importance of the family away days and our women's group in building peer support and accessing cultural experiences.

The King presented a hamper of food for the food bank, which will be passed on to a local family. Annie took him out to the back garden, on the way he stopped to chat to our neighbour who ap-

peared over the fence to say hello. Susan Mitchell showed the King the garden, started by Rory Stewart back in 2016, and developed and nurtured by her and others into a mature and productive space. She proudly discussed that HER potatoes had no blight this year and the benefits of growing Duke of York potatoes, and the King commented how well the leeks were looking.

The King met Yvette Noble who discussed the school uniform bank and our parents and tots group, specifically the baby bank, and he asked if those items are donated or if we have to buy them all (we have to buy them). Kate Dryburgh our volunteer co-ordinator then chatted about how many volunteers are involved. The King commiserated that organising a rota for that many people must be tricky.

Annie told us, 'We were lucky to have Dr Armstrong and two pupils from Kinross High School, Finn and Adam, all who have been heavily involved in food collections and community support for years, who were able to share their experiences with the King.

'Whilst the whole visit to Broke Not Broken lasted ten minutes, our thanks to the many people who were involved in its planning





 the police (big shout to Reg the search dog) local and regional, the press, the team from the King's office, and the local community, and Andy Middlemiss who oversaw the whole operation.

Although both the local MSP and MP were unfortunately ill and could not attend, we would love to invite them both to come and visit us and find out about what we do in the future when they have recuperated. We were really pleased after the visit to welcome a lot of volunteers to the Beacon for tea and cupcakes and a full de-brief. And now it is back to work. And

that work is still hard, because we want to make sure that the next time the King comes to Kinross, that there is no food bank for him to visit.'

His Majesty then went into to St Paul's Church Hall to see the Art Exhibition and met some of our talented local artists. Organisers of the new arts venture told The Newsletter they were thrilled when news came from Buckingham Palace that the King was to include the new arts exhibition in his tour of Kinross on 15 September.

Members of the organising committee which includes some of the exhibiting artists, were delighted to be presented to His Majesty as he viewed their exhibition. Having signed the *Arts@St Paul's* visitors' book T he King made a short visit to the church and also went to meet with the people of Kinross who had turned out in large numbers to greet him.

His Majesty walked from the roundabout at the top of the High Street to the Kinross Day Centre, engaging with the public, including pupils from local schools along the route. The Kinross And District Pipe Band played.

'It's not every day the King visits Kinross,' a local resident told us, delighted to have shaken hands with The King.

Children from Swansacre playgroup were excited to be sitting on shoulders to see above the crowds and to get the chance to chat with the King.

His Majesty met Deputy Lieutenant Jamie Montgomery and the Chairman Of Trustees of Kinross Day Centre, Rev Alan Reid as well as Manager Nan Cook. Accompanied by Reverend Reid, he met and spoke to volunteers and service users in Kinross Day Centre, who were delighted that he was visiting, though he did apologise for holding up their lunch.

## BEHIND THE SCENES

**OUR FIRST REACTION ON being** asked to host His Majesty the King to a visit to Kinross was one of huge excitement, and pride that he had picked us, of the hundreds of smaller communities in Scotland to visit. He obviously reads the Newsletter, and saw what a fabulous place this is! Then, we thought we must get as many local groups involved as we could, to have a say in the planning - Community Council etc. However, the Palace and Police Scotland put an immediate secrecy/security embargo on it all, and we were told to keep it really tight. That changed everything. So a very small planning group was formed by the Lord Lieutenant. So much to think about, so much to get right, so much initial secrecy too... dying to tell everyone, but we couldn't – quite a challenge.

We decided we had to take one lead of each charity to be visited into our secrecy confidence, and start the process. We only had 90 minutes to get it all in... it was tough. It's been even tougher reducing those to actually meet HM to a small number, because of time. Leaders were really understanding about this, and kind to us, as the Palace once again said the numbers of introductions have to be cut. We meet nothing but cooperation. Their only replies were CAN DO... fantastic. The Palace reasons were that HM likes to chat, so if he sees ten in a room, he WILL talk to them all - the clock gets beaten, and his subsequent visits are knocked back or late. The planners know their man - he is chatty, loves engaging with people, and having a bit of banter.

Broke not Broken is tiny inside so that



actually helps — as all the entourage simply cannot all squeeze in, allowing a much more intimate meeting with volunteers. We invite the High School to send two sixth formers and a teacher to the Peace Garden — those who had volunteered before.

One example of making things work... Kinross Primary School has roughly 450 children, and 60+ staff, all of whom we'd have loved to get in behind the barriers at the High st, but Police Scotland were not able to guarantee viewing spots for them. They suggested we can only spread them about the Green Hotel area, and that way they will all get a view of the King. The HT and her staff are fabulous in their help planning all that, and telling the families. It's all a balance between safety, security and allowing

the public to see His Majesty. Cleish – similarly – stand opposite St Paul's and you'll get a great view.

ARTS@STPAUL'S had very cleverly timed their first day exhibition opening, totally coincidentally, on the day of the King's visit – brilliant! Their exhibits are stunning. The church hall looks fabulous. HM loves it and is fascinated by the art and the talented artists and makers. It is agreed HM will sign their visitors' book. On the day, his own pen doesn't work, but our one does! And the church has had a major spruce up, though still needs many restorative things doing, involving large sums to fix.

The Day Centre is buzzing. Their volunteer team, seeing the large recce party, thought it must be council officers plan-

ning some renovations! A lovely plaque to commemorate their fortieth anniversary is covertly made at the Hardware Store – another secret to be kept for a while.

CHAS would like to present two staff and two brave families to HM – Wonderful.

Finally, it's out - the Palace say we can publicise it - and a big sigh of relief all round - we can talk about it openly. The word rapidly starts spreading. We paint, we garden tidy, we try to get the council to replace manky old street signage, we hang pictures with the art team, we wash windows, we deep clean an old church's interior, we move junk, we polish brasses, garden planters are very generously loaned by Caulders for the church area, a most beautiful flower arrangement is created in the church – all in all, very useful exercises in themselves! We start getting a lot of requests for differing things. We reply to loads of special '...but what about this, and that, my appointment / my train etc etc'. We visit all the shops and outlets (ones that were open that day) in the High St area to make sure they know timings, and talk through with them what it means for them.

Inevitably, sadly, we get some gripes. Why isn't HM coming to us, our group, our this/our that? We always get overlooked on Royal visits... not true – the last visit by the Sovereign was in 1960! Well, we're really sorry – we only have 90 minutes, that's all – it can't all be done. Read this Newsletter – every group within its 100 + pages could have been visit starters – but impossible. So it remains as the three key charities in Kinross, who were

to be visited at His Majesty's request, and what a thrill this is for our small, vibrant community.

His Majesty likes four-line biographies and photos of those who he will actually meet, and shake hands with — but we couldn't tell those involved at the beginning why we wanted their photo!

The Palace recce team were large in number, totally charming, and gently firm. They know how these things go – some of our ideas were politely resisted, but mostly they only wanted to do what we in Kinross wanted.

The delightful Personal Protection Officer (PPO) told us it remains his daily honour and privilege to do this. You always see him on TV, a yard or two only from HM's side. His eyes were everywhere, looking for possible areas of threat. What's in there – where does that door lead to, etc?

The police teams came and sealed off manholes in streets – leading to rumours of grisly

murder in Kinross, and that they must be looking for blood or DNA.

D Day minus 2: Early evening and the phone goes. It's the Palace, working their usual long hours, offering a gift from The King to Broke Not Broken. It will be delivered on D Day minus 1. How kind and thoughtful is that?

This has been an enormous thrill and honour to be part of. We pinch ourselves – did this really happen?

We had a great visit by our King. He was a trouper – he chatted, dived into crowds, went off the programme a few times, but was funny, personable, amusing, and thoroughly professional. More will be said elsewhere about the actual visit, but all our plans paid off – it was safe, it was fun and it was an honour.



As a result of the union of the East and West Churches this was made possible through hard work and fundraising. As well as for church use, the building was to be a Day Centre with a committee of church and non-church members, including some members of the Community Council.

cook, there were other posts for1 year duration, also funded by MSC. This scheme was put in by the government to try to alleviate unemployment, and to give training to school leavers with the Youth Training Scheme (YTS).

The committee had been proactive in contacting health pro-

drawing class, a café Franciais and a mother and toddlers group. Popular with widowers was a make do and mend class where they could get help to get the hem back upon their trousers, or even to get their favourite socks darned.

It was a time of great unemployment when the Centre opened and newspapers were scanned regularly at the jobs pages, which is how the Reading Room got its name. After a few months someone suggested a Weekly Midweek Service led by local clergy, and though some of the committee thought it wouldn't take off, it is still going strong, and for some it is the highlight of the week. With the bus, outings were possible, including to the much loved canal trips and the first Day Centre holiday to Pitlochry in summer of 1984. Once a month there were lunches for volunteers with a speaker, and I know they were enjoyed by these attending.

Our oldest member was Archie Renton. At the Centre he was reacquainted with a fellow soldier, Neil Dunn. They had both been in the same trench in Gallipoli during the First World War. Another amazing coincidence was that Margaret Kemp who, during the late 1920s, had lived with her family in Wood Green, London, remembered that while in the domestic science class they had put scones on the windowsill to cool. One of the few English users of the Centre, Bill Briton, remembered being at that same school and sneaking out of the woodwork class to pinch the baking. Mrs Kemp's daughter is now a regular attender of the Centre 40 years on! The living memories group was very popular, and it was great to hear the old stories. There was regular entertainment too, with the highlight being Jimmy Shand and his band coming to play at Archie Renton's 100th Birthday celebration.

No one expected the Day Centre to be such a success so quickly. The small kitchen was at the back door, now a store room, and there was no garden room. Kinross has been so blessed to have the Day Centre. For me it was a great privilege to be the first manager and I am delighted to say that soon after, long term funding was put in place.

With much more emphasis on care in the community than there was 40 years ago, the Centre has continued to develop under the leadership of Dorothy Shorthouse, and now Nan Cook and her amazing team who go the extra mile.

be involved with the new venture. There was great support from local businesses, especially Todd and Duncan, and there was ongoing support from Sir Alan Smith.

The positive response to the Day Centre was overwhelming, and within a very short time after opening there was a very full programme catering for all ages and interests. The coffee bar brought in locals and visitors. The soup and pancakes soon got gold stars! With a bus which was acquired through Help the Aged, older people were brought in from all over Kinross-shire and Glenfarg. At first older people were shy to come. To my surprise one of the first to use the bus was Sister Blyth whom I had known from Edinburgh Royal where I had been a student nurse. All the nurses had been scared of her, but I was soon to find the softer side of Barbara Blyth.

Kinross Day Centre soon got the reputation of being ahead of its time. As well as regular daily lunches for older people, with some after lunch activities, there were also exercise classes, a stroke club and a chiropody service. Using the talents of the many volunteers to lead groups, there was an aerobics class, a portrait





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
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




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# cooking with sarah rankin



#### You will need:

**SERVES 2** 

200g hot smoked trout (or salmon)

1 sliced spring onion

1 tbsp mayonnaise (I use Kewpie)

1 tsp capers

1 tbsp pickled red onion

2 tbsp salsa verde

#### **METHOD**

Ideally you'd leave pickled onions for a day or two to allow the flavours to meld together a little. But by preparing them this way, they'll be ready to eat just as they are. Slice a red onion and soak it in boiling water for a few minutes to soften. Take 100ml red wine vinegar, 1 star anise, a few mustard seeds and 2 tbsp caster sugar. Heat those until the sugar has dissolved and add the drained onions.

To make the salsa verde, just take whatever soft herbs you have to hand – I used flat leaf parsley, a few mint leaves, coriander and chives – chop those finely and mix with 2 minced garlic cloves, a few chopped capers and little chopped green chilli. Mix with extra virgin olive oil to a spooning consistency.

I crisped the tortilla by throwing it directly onto the gas hob and flipping over when nice and charred. You can put it under the grill instead though if you don't have any naked flames to hand! I sprinkled a few salad leaves on the tortilla, flaked the sea trout and mixed with the mayonnaise, capers and spring onion, threw over some pickled onions and a dollop or two of the salsa verde.

Delicious and done in a flash.

I'M HANGING TO THE dying days of summer by my fingertips, regardless of what the weather says, and earlier this week I treated myself to a super easy lunch that spoke of July rather than October. And I'm not even sorry.

I picked up a lovely piece of hot smoked sea trout in Inverkeithing, although I know our own local Fresh Fish Place has hot smoked salmon which would work equally well.

I mixed it with a few pickled red onions, some capers and a sliced spring onion. Those allium and acidic flavours really cut though the rich oiliness of the fish. I topped it with a salsa verde and served on a crisped tortilla.

I have an event to prep for this later this week, so where I would



usually make my own 2 ingredient flatbread, time constraints meant I used a shop bought tortilla which was crisp and delicious.

The whole thing took about 5 minutes so a really quick and easy lunch. Or top it with a crispy fried egg for an elegant Sunday brunch.

#### **Kinross Recyling Centre Opening Hours**

A NUMBER OF residents have been in touch about the new hours for the recycling centre. PKC agreed, as part of



its annual budget, that in order to make costs savings and avoid redundancies, that all centres in P&K would be reduced by two days per week and two hours per day. This also ensures that all centres remained open. No reduction in service is ever welcome but this seemed a sensible compromise to ensure that no part of Perth & Kinross was left without a facility.

However, whilst the centre will be open at the weekend, there have been questions about the early closing times (3.45pm last entry) given that most people work during the week. I agree with the view that having them open in the evenings would make more sense when people can actually use them. Myself and other ward councillors have opened a dialogue with PKC officers about what flexibility there might be regarding the opening hours, including getting some more detailed data about daily usage times.

#### Fibre Broadband Update - Check If You're Live!

A NUMBER OF additional rural areas are now able to connect to Fibre To The Premises (FTTP) following the latest round of fibre roll-out but might not necessarily know about it. There doesn't seem to be much communication from providers about this, which does seem odd.

Areas around Coldrain, Gairney Bank, Gairneybridge, Hatchbank Rd, East/West Brackley, Easter Balgedie, RSPB Vane Farm, Kinnesswood, Levenmouth, Auchmuirbride, Middleton, Netherton, Netherhall add Balado as well as the parts near Cleish that were not already connected, should now or soon be live. I know that there are still some teething problems with some houses in terms of getting access to infrastructure for the final installations but these shall hopefully be resolved.

You can check if you can get a fibre connection by visiting www.broadbandchecker.btwholesale.com. Make sure to click on 'Address Checker' and then you can search for your house by post code. If you can now get FTTP, it should say 'WBC FTTP' and the downstream line rate listed as '1000 Mbps'. If you are having any problems please contact me.

Kinross-shire is now one of the best connected parts of the UK for high speed broadband. I plan to have discussions soon to see about areas that are still out of reach to see what can be done. Orders to get connected can be placed via a wide choice of service providers, including BT, EE, Plusnet, Sky, TalkTalk, Zen, Vodafone and others listed at: www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/fttpproviders.

#### **Smart Energy Network**

AT THE END of August, I had the privilege of opening a world-first 'spiral-flow battery' smart energy store at Friarton Waste Depot in Perth. The battery

was designed, developed, and manufactured by StorTera, an Edinburgh-based developer of intelligent energy storage solutions.

The deployment of this ground-breaking technology demonstrates our commitment to tackling the climate emergency and reducing the council's carbon footprint.

The new system will help bring down energy costs through smarter management energy while reducing carbon emissions and supporting the move low-carbon towards transport and heating. This smart energy network has the ability to fully utilise solar power generated onsite at the Friarton Depot by storing excess energy in batteries for use when required or

when energy prices are high and generate revenue by providing renewable energy to the electricity network, as well as power the council's wider energy needs through peer-to-peer connections.

This type of innovation will be key to reducing our carbon footprint, and this energy storage system, designed and built in Scotland, is the first of its kind to be used in this way.


As always, it's great to see a large number of local organisations, businesses, and individuals make this year's gathering a great success, with a little help from the weather.

#### **Cost Of Living Crisis**

I FULLY APPRECIATE that many people are being very careful with their spending because of the current rate of inflation and the cost of energy. Unfortunately



the Scottish Government has decided this would be a good time to make changes to the council tax system. The proposals which were put out for consultation (the consultation closed at the end of September) will increase band E by 7.5%, band F by 12.5%, band G by 17.5% and band H by 22.5%.

The average annual increases, based on 2023-24 Council Tax rates, would be around £139, £288, £485 and £781 per dwelling in these bands respectively. Any changes would come into effect at the start of the 2024-25 financial year. This would be in addition to any Council Tax increases imposed as part of the Council budget next February. I have responded to the consultation saying this is not the correct time to be further increasing taxation on already hard-pressed people.

# Important Survey - Perth And Kinross Health And Social Care Partnership Consultation (P&KHSCP)

TO ENSURE WE continue to have access to the best possible health care P&KHSCP are planning some changes to the way services are delivered in primary care, which includes our GP practice. They say these changes are needed for a number of reasons, which include:

- Nationally, GPs need to provide increasingly more complex care to a growing population
- Perth and Kinross has an increasingly older population who have more complex needs
- There is a national shortage of doctors, including here in Perth and Kinross. This is due to issues with recruiting and retaining doctors and many of our doctors are nearing retirement

They say one of the ways to resolve some of those challenges is to move towards providing care to patients using a multi-disciplinary team. This means patients receiving care from other health professionals working at the GP practice. The team members will work alongside the GP, and each member of the team has a particular skill set and specialist knowledge. For example, physiotherapists, pharmacists and mental health and wellbeing nurses.

Another way to help use your time and the health professional's time better will be to offer Telephone Appointments or Virtual Appointments. They say that to deliver the care needed today, and into the future, GP practices and the buildings where they are based, need to be able to adapt. This survey is part of Perth and Kinross Health and Social Partnership's Primary Care Premises Strategy which sets out how they move from where we are now to a future which enables general practice to continue to meet the healthcare needs of the people in Perth & Kinross. This survey is for people registered with a GP Practice in Perth & Kinross. It is important that people respond. It will give the P&KHSCP a better understanding of how patients view their local GP practice or health centre and help them to understand what patients think about how we should be planning for the future of service provision here in Kinross-shire. #### **Council Transformation**

PERTH AND KINROSS Council is going through several transformation projects, both because of financial pressures, but also because elected members



decided they were necessary. One of the projects is focussed on restructuring the senior management, with a view to improving the way the Council works and to make savings, with a reduction of the senior management team.

Over the last two months, I along with four other Senior Councillors and the Chief Executive have been going through a recruitment process for a Director of Economy, Place and Learning.

This role will be at a strategic level, with five new strategic leads reporting to them. These strategic leads will have responsibility for the day-to-day operations of Education, Children's services, Family services, Justice services, Economic development, Planning, the Environment services (roads, grounds maintenance, recycling, etc.), Infrastructure, Housing and Community services.

So, altogether a wide-ranging role!

The culmination of the selection process was two days of interviews, with the final selection being made on Wednesday 20th September. I hope we have chosen the correct candidate!

#### Office Transformation

THE COUNCIL CURRENTLY has 12,600 M² of office space in Perth, currently costing £3.45 million a year! Officers have calculated that there is an actual need for 8,000 M² of office space, plus 1,000 M² of storage. So clearly, the Council needs to consolidate into less space to save money, which can be spent elsewhere. At its budget setting meeting in March of this year, Council agreed that Pullar House needed to be vacated and mothballed before April 2024, as the 25-year-old Public-Private Partnership (PPP) contract, which is now costing millions of pounds a year, was due to end in 2025. This decision is due to be reviewed at the October full Council meeting, as officers want to explore different options.

I attended a high-level meeting, with Directors and other Independent Councillors today, to discuss the best way forward.

I take the view that the Council needs to agree an area-wide, long-term policy on hybrid working, as this will impact on the actual office space needed. I also take the view that the Council needs to agree a strategy, with a vision of how its office accommodation throughout Perth and Kinross should look in 25 years, so that every step on the path goes in the same direction. As far as I can see, this degree of planning is currently, sadly lacking. I put both these points to the meeting and they were taken on board.



I DON'T THINK I have ever been at a service where the celebrant swore so much. But then I've not been to many funeral services so carefully choreographed by the deceased.





The air was blue at Alloa Town Hall. Irene had been determined to go out with a bang. She'd chosen the music. She'd chosen the photographs which filled the big video screen. And she made sure that the tears were interrupted by laughter. The poor celebrant had been left with no choice. Irene liked to swear, and she had scripted some choice quips for posthumous quotation.

The sedate auld hall rocked to music from the 70s and 80s. Every seat was taken - even the galleries had folk who had known and loved Irene looking down on events below. All agreed they'd been to gey few funerals like it.

Irene's bravery in the face of her cancer was an inspiration. You see Irene never said, 'I can't'. Her motto was always 'give it a try — what's the worst that can happen?' When she lost her arm to cancer more than a decade ago she learnt to take photographs using just the one airm. Long walks across her beloved Clackmannanshire resulted in professional images of snow on bracken, mist over the Ochils, and countless full moons in all their pale, luminous wonder. Some of us were lucky enough to get one of her end of year calendars with her favourite shots selected. Irene was passionate about her county and passionate about her country, devoting time and toil to Scottish independence, a cause she held close to her heart.

Many in the hall for her funeral remember her days as a Clackmannanshire Councillor. Indeed, the Council had marked her death by flying their flag at half-mast. She was remembered as a tenacious advocate, working tirelessly to resolve her constituents' problems — the very model of a fine local government elected representative. When she decided she liked you there was ne'er a more loyal friend. She came to hear me speak at my first hustings when I applied to be a candidate in Ochil and South Perthshire. And when I was selected as candidate she was the heart of the campaign dispensing wit and wisdom with endless tea and sickly sweet cakes.

When I won — as I told the congregation at her funeral — it was blindingly obvious that I needed her on my staff. I invited her to join me the day after the election. 'Aye fine' she said, before asking whether I'd be holding a celebration party. When I told her I would, she said 'Great. But no Village People noo. I know you gays love the Village People. But I canna do the YMCA.' This was said as she demonstrated her wan airmed version.

I saw Irene shortly before she died. She was sitting in bed at home, her quick-tempered cat Indy lying protectively at her head. She looked up at me and laughed 'Well John, look at me. Just living the dream.' Irreplaceable Irene Hamilton. Funny, kind, and brave. I will miss her. We all will.

# Liz Smith, MSP

FOR THE LAST ten years I have listened to some of the most harrowing stories that I have ever heard; of intense and permanent medical and psychological pain, families broken apart and heart-rending accounts of victims' attempts to get to the truth, only to be knocked back at every turn.



As Newsletter readers will know from my previous columns, or local/national press, I am referencing the horrific scandal at NHS

local/national press, I am referencing the horrific scandal at NHS Tayside in which hundreds of patients were operated on by the now disgraced neurosurgeon, Professor Sam Eljamel.

On 7 September, the Scottish Government finally granted a full, independent inquiry into the circumstances which allowed Eljamel to harm so many patients – possibly up to 200 of them. I would like to especially mention my constituents Jules Rose and Pat Kelly who I have worked with for all this time, and who deserve so much credit for this outcome which finally brings sufficient justice to the former patients.

But this scandal extends far beyond the medical and clinical malpractice by Eljamel, and we must closely scrutinise the horrific failures within NHS Tayside and the other health agencies that allowed it to happen. We have the evidence that clinicians and managers knew what was going on but did not confront the issue. An independent inquiry is so important to ensure similar negligence can never happen again.

I am very well aware that the granting of a public inquiry will not take away the physical and psychological pain for the patients and their families but it will give them some hope that, one day, we will get to the truth about what took place.

OXFORD PROFESSOR DANNY Dorling recently cited the introduction of the Scottish Child Payment as having the biggest impact on a reduction in child poverty 'since the fall of Berlin Wall'. The payment of £25 per week, available to



eligible children under the age of 16, is one of five family payments available from the Scottish Government which provide regular financial support to low income families. 7,055 children in Perth and Kinross have benefitted from the Scottish Child Payment, according to the latest figures released by the Scottish Government – with £7761,555 having been paid to families in Perth and Kinross-shire alone. The Scottish Child Payment is designed to combat child poverty and support families across Scotland, and these figures demonstrate the significant impact of this for 7,055 children in Perth and Kinross, and 316,190 across the whole of Scotland.

Following its introduction in February 2021, the payment is the most ambitious anti-poverty measure to be implemented in the UK. It has been hailed as a 'game-changer' in tackling child poverty by the Child Poverty Action Group and described as a 'lifesaver' by parents. I know that families across Kinross are benefiting from this ambitious policy and I want to encourage anyone who thinks that they may qualify, but isn't already receiving it, to call Social Security Scotland on 0800 182 2222.

I also welcome the introduction of the new Carer Support Payment in Perth and Kinross following the announcement of improved support for unpaid carers in the Programme for Government. Piloting in Dundee City, Na h-Eileanan an Iar and Perth and Kinross, adults can apply for the new Carer Support Payment, and those already in receipt of Carer's Allowance automatically receiving the new payment instead from February 2024. Unlike previous support, the payment will be available to unpaid carers who are studying full-time. I am pleased to see this 14th benefit provided by Social Security Scotland, pilot in Perth and Kinross.

Recently I met with constituents who were harmed by former NHS Tayside surgeon, Sam Eljamel. The recent report found missed opportunities for senior management to intervene and protect patients. Despite a rising number of complaints, it said NHS Tayside failed to put in place adequate restrictions and monitoring of Professor Eljamel. I am therefor pleased that the Scottish Government have committed to a full public inquiry, alongside individual case reviews. Whilst this process cannot repair the damage done by Professor Eljamel, I hope that it will provide some answers to those impacted by his malpractice.



#### **CAR CRIME**

#### What should I think about before setting off?

- Permanently mark any valuables you use in the vehicle, such as a Satellite Navigation System (Sat Nav), with your postcode and house number/name. You can register all of your equipment at www.immobilise.com.
- Fit a car alarm.
- Use locking wheel nuts to prevent the theft of your wheels.
- NEVER leave your car unattended to defrost windows with the keys in the ignition. Many car thieves actively target this

   even first thing in the morning when darkness can provide cover. Any insurance claim could be adversely affected as it may be considered driver negligence. It's also an offence to leave a car unattended on a road with the engine running.

#### What should I do when re-fuelling at a petrol station?

 Always remove keys from the ignition and lock your car if you need to walk to the petrol station shop to pay for your fuel. Again, some car thieves actively lookout for insecure cars that can easily be taken from the forecourt and any insurance claim could be affected.

#### Where should I park?

- Keep your car off the street if possible. If you have a garage, use it. Make sure you lock both car and garage.
- If you don't have a garage, make use of the driveway if you have one.
- For more information about the security of the garage you keep your car in at home, see our advice on how to Keep your Home Secure
- If parking in public or using airport parking, look for a car park with the Park Mark sign. These designated car parks have complied with specific measures to deter crime and anti-social behaviour. Find a location at www.parkmark.co.uk
- Don't park in isolated or remote areas. Whenever possible, park in a busy, well-lit and CCTV covered area.
- Try and park close to the exit this will increase the amount of traffic which will pass your car, making it harder for thieves to operate undetected.

#### What should I do after I park?

- Lock all items out of sight. Don't leave anything on display and take valuables with you; particularly power tools
- Leave the glove box empty and open.
- If you have a Sat Nav, hide the cradle and take the system with you. Don't forget to wipe the suction marks off the window.
- If you have personal correspondence in the vehicle, then take it with you. Don't give others access to important personal information or your home address.
- Use an electronic or mechanical immobiliser such as a steering lock.
- If you have an alarm then make sure it's set.
- MLA approved locksmiths can help with vehicle keys and locks if required





# Kinross Community Council News from the July Meeting

**Present**: CCllr L McKay, (Chair), CCllr M Wilson, CCllr W Freeman, CCllr H Phillips and CCllr C Collins, Co-opted member Sharon Wells, Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, R Watters and 2 MoP

#### **Police Report**

PC B Samson was unable to attend the meeting but had forwarded a report. There had been quite a few local break-ins. Speedchecks had recently been carried out at the Muirs and at Gairneybridge.

#### Craighead Wind Farms – Alex Orr

Mr Alex Orr from Galileo attended the meeting and gave an update on the proposed wind farm. The number of turbines has been reduced from 12 to 10 but they will still be the same height – up to 200m. This is in line with the rest of Europe. Turbines likely to be 250mm-300mm in the next 6/7 years.

The combined output will still be over 50MW so a Section 36 Application will be made. Landscape topography, viewpoint photos, bird surveys, archaeological walk over and peat probing are done. Ecological studies are almost complete. Noise assessment is in progress, with sensors checking noise doesn't break limits. All surveys are expected to be finished by October 2023.

A Community Wealth Fund of £5k/MW i.e. £300k/year is proposed to be created. Galileo have put forward the following ideas for discussion: A £100k construction period disruption fund; sums to discount electricity costs for properties within 5km from the turbines — this would cover over 600 properties. Payments per year would be on a sliding scale based on distance: 1.5km - £1.4k; 2km - £1.2k; 2.5km - £1k; 3km - £800; 3.5km - £600; 4km - £400 and 5km - £200.

A further consultation event will take place at Carnbo Village Hall on 28 August between 3.30 and 7.30 pm.

An MOP asked: How far away can they be seen? Answer: 50km from out at sea.

Will they need hydrocarbons to work? Gears require oil!

NF asked if both applications were likely to go ahead? They may need to complement each other. Brunthill were asking for 220 turbines, this has now dropped to 200.

#### **Matters Arising**

To prevent items falling off the list for discussion (e.g. The Common Good Fund), it was proposed that a log of actions for CCllrs should be kept. Common Good Fund needs to be a KCC item as it belongs only to Kinross and no other CC area.

Foliage has been cut near Sainsburys as requested.

Gallowhill is still missing a VAS sign.

**Dentist Situation:** CCIIr C Collins wrote to Jim Fairlie and has had a reply. A fund has been set up by the Scottish Government to attract new NHS dental practises. Contact the CC if you would like to see the letters.

**Shop Windows:** owners have been contacted to ask about these being cleaned.

**Replacement Boundary Fences:** Had asked for these to be opened. The gates are locked at Old Cleish Road preventing

**Locker Key Refunds:** Kinross High School will only pay by BACS which requires bank details to be sent. PKC looking into this system.

#### **Kinross Town Centre**

Signage being worked on. Clock Tower owner has offered to gift it back to community. Discussion ensued on the probable costs of upkeep. Cllr Cuthbert suggested the Common Good Fund. Suggested that we could write to officers and request it is returned back to community as it is a Grade A listed building and scheduled monument.

**CCIIr C Collins** Possibility of seagull proof bins for Kirkgate? Seen elsewhere with plastic strips, not expensive solution. Lots of mess caused by gulls emptying bins of chip boxes etc. CC to write to PKC Greenspace Team.

#### **Police Report**

From 1 August 2023 there have been 67 calls to Police from the Fossoway area and five crimes recorded on Police systems. Between 7 and 8 August there was a theft of car registration plates in Crook of Devon and on the 9 August a robbery on A823 near Powmill. Both are subject to live investigations.

Over the last month local officers from Kinross have been carrying out speed checks across the Kinross area. This included checks in Crook of Devon. On 20/08/2023 Traffic officers were carrying out speed checks at Junction 5 on the M90 whereby one vehicle was stopped for speeding and the driver charged accordingly. Police Scotland stated that any crimes that are reported to them are investigated to the best of their ability.

#### **MoP Questions and Answers**

**Q:** People on horseback have irreversibly damaged crops in fields – how can this be stopped?

**A:** Police Scotland to follow up with MoP.

**Q:** Concerns were raised over speeding of HGVs on A977 & A91 and vehicles following Knockhill events on A823 and A977; Vehicles failing to stop at red traffic lights in Powmill at night.

#### **Matters Arising**

#### **Brunthill Wind Farm**

Two representatives from E-power (Alan MacIntyre) and Pagoda (Keith Geddes) who are proposing the Brunthill Wind farm attended the meeting and provided an update on their plans. 18 turbines (185m) are proposed in an area that is designated group 3 which is defined as a potential development area for wind farms. Site is intended to be operational in 2030 to help meet Scotland's net zero target. Ecology and other surveys started in 2020. Background noise assessments will be conducted. Planning application will include socio economic benefits which with a 35yr life could equate to £22.5million. Also propose to increase biodiversity. Aim for planning submission Nov 2023 with PKC committee Q2 2024 with Scottish Ministers' decision anticipated Q2 2025 or if an appeal is required then 2026.

#### **MoP Questions and Answers**

Q: What is length of blade to be transported?

**A:** 80m. Use of night transport will be decided by Police & PKC. Number of lorry visits to site not yet decided.

Q: Can you acquire and use shorter turbines?

A: Can do now but will not able to in future when build commences

Q: What will be the impact on migratory birds?

A: Ornithologists have been on site for 2 yrs. monitoring flight paths.

Q: Where is generated power going?

**A:** The windfarm is being built to support Scotland's Net zero 2030 target. Energy will go onto National Grid.

**Q:** Is the conflict between NPF4 and PKC policy on renewable energy an issue?

A: Developer is aware of conflict.

CCIIr Duffy requested that the Developer engage directly with the Carnbo community.

#### Windfarm Joint Meeting with other CCs

CCIIr Bruce-Jones attended a closed meeting with other CCs on 10 August to discuss and decide on a joint response. The aim was to discuss what the CCs should and could do together in relation to the proposed windfarm projects at Craighead Farm and Brunthill, both of which will directly impact our communities.

Whilst there was no decision that CCs approved or disapproved of these projects it was emphasised that it was important that there was a consistent approach, that our responses should ensure that the needs of the communities were paramount and that there was a need to plan ahead so that we can negotiate with developers.



If these projects do go ahead and given NPF4 and the Scottish Government strategy it is looking increasingly likely, it is important that we consult on mitigation measures and that any community benefit money stays within the community. Examples cited included use of renewables funding in Glenfarg for the Community Bus service. Other ideas included ensuring that community funds could be used to support sustainability projects such as home or public building insulation, charging stations, employing a Bid Writer to help with funding applications. Need to be inventive and set strategic goals with what could be considerable sums.

Agreed that we needed to establish exactly what PKC strategy was in relation to windfarms as they will be Statutory Consultees and what plans they have for our communities. Suggested the need to establish either a Community Action Group or Community Development Plans that could make full use of funding.

If a group is established, it would have to be properly constituted and include elected Community Councillors to ensure accountability and transparency.

Some of those present will attend the CARES – Community and Renewable Energy Scheme Conference on 19 September and will report back at the next meeting on Thursday 28 September.

#### **MoP Questions and Answers**

**Q:** Concern raised that in other industries the community benefit fund did not materialise. How can we avoid this?

A: CC understands that this is a legislative requirement.

The CC has received a similar invitation to a meeting organised by Friends of the Ochils also looking to formulate a joint response.

#### **Community Development Trust**

Mike Barnacle reported that there are now 45 members. Bank account is being actioned and then the CDT will join DTAS. The CDT will work with DTAS to seek funding to create a professional local place plan. Currently preparing business case for lease of Blairingone School.

#### **Local Place Plans**

CCIIr Marchant reported a summary of the early findings from the Big Place Conversations which were presented at the Fossoway Gathering. The CC will receive a formal report from PKC end of September.

# Road Safety in FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo):

CCIIr Bruce-Jones reported the following:

A977 Mitigation Signalisation at School Road Junction is underway and due to be completed this month. Following representations from this CC, PKC have raised the issue of temporary traffic control lights not working fully and requested that the contractor remains on site between 8am and 6pm. If any issues out with these times, then could they be reported to 01738 476476, the out of hours roads emergency number and this will ensure it is dealt with as quickly as possible.

Signage warning of lights is already in place for traffic heading west which will remain and for east bound traffic new signage will be placed at the corner of the village hall to give advance warning to drivers coming around the bend.

Drum Signalisation is due to commence in October. There are still details regarding design to be finalised and we have requested sight of final plans. We have contributed requests from residents including maintaining pavement and pedestrian access, safe route to school and speed reduction to 30mph.

#### Carnbo

We have received the following from PKC.

As advised at the Kinross-shire Local Committee meeting on 24 August 2023 the delivery of the Carnbo 30mph speed limit is at an advanced stage. There had been some delays as a result of an objection to a proposed 30mph speed limit at another location in the P&K area. However, on advice from our Legal colleagues we have been able to proceed with those 12 locations where no objections had been received.

The legalities of the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) are almost complete and with our Legal colleagues to finalise. Last week Blair Watt met with our signing contractor (Tayside Contracts) to discuss the delivery of the 12 unopposed 30mph speed limits that are being installed throughout the Perth & Kinross area. Carnbo is one of two new speed limits amongst the 12 and as such we have asked that this be prioritised and for it to be one of the first 30mph speed limits to be installed. The contractor is working on the installation programme and as soon as we have this, we will advise you of the planned dates. It is our understanding that the signing works will commence at the end of this month and continue into October 2023.

#### **MoP Questions and Answers**

**Q:** Concern raised that new school road traffic lights may cause more accidents especially in Winter. Belief that new lights will be set red as in Blairingone and that this could lead to more cars idling and pollution. Is this correct?

**A:** A977 mitigation was consulted on with community and aims to reduce speed of traffic and volume of HGVs. CC understands that new traffic lights will be set to green and warning signs will be placed in village. Cllr Watters will confirm.

# Fossoway Area Transport incl. Transport Group and Bus Service

CCIIr Lamb reported that he monitors the 202 bus and has reported that it is not reliable mainly due to condition of the buses used on the route. PKC concur with this and Margaret Roy has met with Stagecoach to discuss this. One solution that they have proposed is to put on larger single decker buses but that would require amendments to the route. The CC does not see that this is an acceptable solution. CCIIr Lamb is going to meet with Glenfarg Community Bus group to discuss their operation.

#### **MoP Questions and Answers**

**Q:** Failure of 202 bus has caused MoP to miss two doctors' appointments and be stranded in Kinross. What is being done to improve reliability and why doesn't service extend to Loch Leven Campus?

**A:** CCIIr Lamb is discussing reliability and route with PKC. Noted that Stagecoach tracking app is now more reliable. Tendering of contract occurs annually so may not be able to alter route until then. CCIIr Duffy noted residents still have access to DRT although it is limited.

#### **Fossoway Gathering**

CCIIr Duffy reported it was a very successful day.

#### **Local Area Committee**

Workshop 2 August 2023 Afternoon session for all Committee Members i.e., four elected Ward Councillors (voting), representatives of six CCs (non-Voting) and PKC Officers. A very useful session where we reviewed the background and aims of the Committee, discussed, and agreed practical arrangements for the future and did SWAT analysis. This in particular enabled us to see what worked, what didn't, how it could be expanded and what risks it faced.

We reviewed the findings of the ICONIC Evaluation Report on the Pilot Scheme and an opportunity to set a clear course of action for the future.

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#### Community Council News

It was agreed that structure remain as Scheme of Administration so that only Councillors and CCs would be members, with only Councillors having voting rights. CCs would have advisory/consultative role. This ensured that it remained a Decision-Making Committee not just advisory.

Name change to Kinross-shire Committee agreed to ensure consistency and it will meet quarterly with CCs encouraged to submit agenda items to the Committee via PKC secretariat.

An update on Road Safety Measures in the area was received. Blairingone former School and Community asset transfer. Business

Blairingone former School and Community asset transfer. Business case is being developed by CDT.

Winter Maintenance Programme clearer idea of priorities, availability of a push pavement sweeper for community use by volunteers — we just have to ask, importance of providing feedback to PKC team to ensure our local priorities particularly in the shire villages are dealt with. Requested that new roads and pavements be included in this year's schedule, importance of school access roads being cleared particularly as often on side roads that are not on the priority list. CCs to provide priorities for villages. Push Along Footway Gritters are also available from PKC for community volunteers to use: PKC RMP@pkc.gov.uk

Recommendation that CCs add an item to their own agendas to have input for future KC Agenda items.

Kinross-shire Committee is no longer just a pilot scheme and Council have voted for its continuance.

#### **PKC Consultations**

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils Response from CC was submitted.

Tayside and Central Scotland (TacTran) Regional Transport Strategy (RTS) is a partnership plan identifying the strategic transport priorities for the Angus, Dundee City, Perth & Kinross, and Stirling Council areas. The CC welcomes the strategy especially the focus on working across local authorities and focus on rural transport but believes that the strategy could be improved by considering alternatives to public transport and the use of more positive language. Closes 27 October 2023.

#### **Scottish Government Consultations**

Effective community engagement in local development planning guidance A consultation about the new approach to local development planning forming part of the Government's work on reform of the planning system and implementation of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019. The CC supports this guidance and has recently partnered with PKC in use of the toolkit. Closes 13 September.

#### Mandatory training on planning for elected members

Elected members have a crucial role in the decision-making process within the planning system, so it is vital that adequate training helps them make decisions that are robust and sound. Closes 26 October.

#### **Community Council Business**

**Meetings Attended:** CCIIr Cheape attended the Kinross Fund meeting on 4 September, two applications were considered, the Kinross Open Spaces Action Group was seeking a grant of £2,000.



General principle supported but due to an inadequate business plan the decision was deferred until December meeting. Kinross After School Club were considered to be a good cause and their requested grant of £3000 was awarded.

CCIIr Duffy announced that she is resigning from the CC in October and that this is the last meeting she will be attending. CCIIr Duffy will be coming to our Nov meeting so that we can formally thank her for her 16 years of service.


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
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# **Clubs & Community Groups**

#### **Kinross Probus Club**

#### **Thatching In Perthshire**

How many of us have been to, or even heard of, the small village of Kinrossie? It is a linear village in Perth and Kinross, less than a mile south of the A94 road,



8 miles from Perth and 6 miles from Coupar Angus. Kinrossie retains the typical layout of a Scottish village, comprising a broad main street lined with houses dating from the 18th and 19th centuries, with some 20th century replacement buildings.

Martin Payne, who lives in Kinrossie, came to Probus to tell us about his experience of living in a thatched cottage and having the roof rethatched in the traditional manner.

Thatching is the craft of building a roof with dry vegetation such as straw, water reed, sedge, rushes, heather, or palm branches, layering the vegetation so as to shed water away from the inner roof. Since the bulk of the vegetation stays dry and is densely packed, trapping air, thatching also functions as insulation. It is a very old roofing method and has been used in both tropical and temperate climates.

In times past the skills of building haystacks in the fields were transferred to roof thatching and in rural areas thatch was the fairly standard option. As these skills were slowly lost thatching became less common and much more expensive and many estate owners would no longer rethatch but cover roofs with corrugated iron. Latest surveys indicate there are only around 300 thatched properties left in Scotland with only 200 of them in their original condition.

The thatching material used today is mainly water reed and we have a local supplier based in Errol. Originally established to protect the riverbed and banks, it has proved to be the perfect material for rethatching.

Martin explained the techniques used by his contractors to strip out the old thatch and rebuild using tried and tested methods. It is back breaking work but done with skill and enthusiasm which produced the perfect end result of a rethatched roof which should last another 45 years.

So the next time you fancy a trip up past Perth, take a wee detour off the A94 and visit Kinrossie to see one of the best examples of a thatched cottage.

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### **Town Twinning Association**

Perth & Kinross Council held a meeting of all twinning associations in the area with a view to offering more support over the next few years. The council is

evolving a strategic lead on existing and potential new twinnings. Five 'bailies' have been appointed to oversee this initiative with Claire McLaren being the French representative. A 'support plan' is being formulated to allow twinning organisations equal access to council support and funding within set criteria, but with a focus on 'special' anniversaries allowing access to a possible civic reception, ambassador visit and access to community minibuses.

Twinning organisations which operate under the umbrella of community councils have automatic access to free public liability insurance and risk assessment support. Council twinning guidelines on protocols and procedures will follow.

There will be a number of significant anniversaries in 2026 (Aschaffenburg 70, Perth Canada, Perth Australia and Cognac). An international festival is planned for August 2026 with a focus on the Salute and Highland Games. PKC have a model constitution for twinning organisations and a vision which encapsulates cultural, tourist and economic benefits and impact. They are preparing an engagement report on existing twinnings. The council is also keen to involve schools via links and exchanges with the education department. It is also hoped that local councillors will be encouraged to get involved.

Twinning organisations are encouraged to produce case studies of

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how they operate, with frequency and styles of exchanges. These organisations have access to local common good funding as well as other funding bodies.

A summary of Kinross and District Town Twinning Association's operational status is as follows. Initially twinning visits were every year but this changed to a three year cycle with one year of no visits between the alternate visits. In 2024 will celebrate 50 years since the Gacéans first came to Kinross.

The year 2025 was scheduled to be a year of no visits but, as it will be 50 years since Kinross first visited Gacé, they have requested that we visit then as part of their celebrations.

It is hoped that Kinross High School links with the two Gacé secondary schools will be re-established post Covid-19.

The Kinross twinning committee is meeting at the end of September for a debrief meeting to reflect on the recent visit to Gacé and to prepare for the forthcoming visit of our Normandy twinning families at the end of July 2024.



Both the original and the new-fangled editions will be available on the day.

There'll be tea and coffee as well as all the apple juice. Please bring cash for donations to help pay for the event (there's no entry fee) and also bring containers if you'd like to take away some apple juice.

If it's a really wet afternoon, we'll be in Portmoak Village Hall, a solution which has worked well in the past. If it's merely light showers, remember your brolly.

In other news, we were delighted to welcome eight volunteers from the Scottish Environment Protection Agency to help pull birch from the raised peat bog which we're restoring in Portmoak Moss. 



#### **Kinross Beavers**


And we're back! We kicked off the new term learning about the Code of Conduct, hearing about what everyone had been up to during the summer holidays and playing some games outdoors.



It has been a busy few weeks for Kinross Road Runners starting with stunning scenery surrounding Taymouth Castle which provided the backdrop for the Drummond Hill trail 10k. It must have had an impact on our 12 runners as 6 of them took home prizes (above).

The Mob Match this is a club-on-club affair usually just involving two clubs and two sets of colours where the lowest score wins. In 2022 Perth Road Runners challenged KRR to exactly this, thereby inaugurating this 'friendly' fixture.

In 2023 KRR invited Perth for a re-match, this time on home turf and, as the current holders of the Peter Rabbit trophy, KRR were not going to let him go without a fight and the ignominy of having to swap his smart blue and yellow jacket for a green one!

What a match! Starting at Fossoway school road, 55 men and 40 women eagerly awaited the race to start. With so many runners on a narrow path, men went out first with the women three minutes later.

On an undulating course with bridges, narrow wooded tracks and the gloom of the Devon gorge near Rumbling Bridge, runners made their way back to the finish line by Crook of Devon village hall. Such is the format that later-placed runners play as crucial a role in scoring as the first athletes home so there is all to play for.

Back inside the village hall for tea, sandwiches and cake, everyone awaited the final results. Although Perth claimed both individual winners of the race, it was a landslide victory for both KRR men (606-669) and women (178 - 243) and best of all, Peter can wear his smart blue and yellow jacket for another year! Mob Match aside, KRR were in action at the Ochil 2000s where Fiona Horsfield clocked 4:19.04 while at the Killin 10k, Barry Smith posted 39.38.

Over at the Kirkcaldy Parks half marathon, 6 runners completed the course with Stephen Freeland leading them home in 1:30.04. Andy Bruce was next in 1:41.33 which shows his training for the Loch Ness marathon in a few weeks is paying off. 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

**OCTOBER IS ONE OF** the busiest months of the year for birds at Loch Leven. We can see up to 80,000 birds using the loch during these peak months! Look out for species such as goldeneye, pochard, pintail, teal, wigeon, tufted duck and coot, among others. Check out our Facebook and Instagram (*@LochLevenNNR*) for all the latest numbers from our bird counts, and any rarities we might see this month! We still ask for no paddleboards, kayaks, canoeists and swimmers on the loch at this time of year to protect these large numbers of winter visitors.

Pink-footed goose numbers should be at around 8000-15000 this month depending on how many continue to head south. If visiting during the day, you may see skeins pass over head to feed in nearby fields.

However, the best time of year to see the 'pinkie' spectacle is in the morning at sunrise when they take off from the loch in their thousands. Kirkgate cemetery is a great place to watch this spectacle – check out our social media for dates and times of future Goose Sunrise events to gather and watch the pinkies take off.

Whooper swans are now a common site at Loch Leven as we get into October. These birds have spent their summer in Iceland but migrate to the UK in the winter for our 'warm' climate, as unbelievable as that may sound! This is an 800-mile crossing over the sea, which is the longest migration of any swan – they are

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quite incredible birds! We normally get around 300-400 on the loch over winter so look out for their bright yellow bills to distinguish them from resident mute swans, and listen out for their honks and hoots!

It is feeling quite autumnal now we've reached October and it's lovely to see the colour in the leaves changing and seeing the yellows, oranges and reds of various leaves before they fall and carpet the trail with colour. I recommend taking a look at various tree species and see the difference in the fallen leaves! If you need any help with ID then we will once again be putting up our Magical Tree Trail at Burleigh at the end of this month in preparation for Halloween!

October is also a great time to look out for fungi along the trail. There are various species of all shapes, colours and sizes to have a look at, including fly agaric, stinkhorn, jelly antler and much more!

As we move more into winter, then keep an eye out for wintering thrushes such as Redwing which become more obvious as the branches become bare and can be seen feeding on berries across the reserve.

Slavonion Grebe is another species to look out for - we get a small population wintering here and they are an exciting species to see!

## **RSPB Loch Leven**





AS WE MOVE TOWARDS October, we are beginning to feel the change in the seasons with the wind picking up, rustling through the yellow and orange tinted leaves that speckle the branches. This month, we have had some great sightings of Osprey that have been moving through and stopping to fish on the loch with numbers as high as five at one time. We are also continuing to see both marsh and hen harrier flying over the reserve, and we caught glimpses of a great white egret out at St Serfs. As we start to experience some colder northernly winds, we are excited to be both hearing and seeing the return of the pink-footed geese who come to feed here over winter and are looking forward to them returning in their masses later this month. If you would be keen to witness this spectacular, why not join Site Manager, Vicky, for our Dawn Goose Walks taking place on the 18 and 22 October?

In preparation for the arrival of the geese, our reserve team and volunteers have been hard at work trying to repair and maintain some of the infrastructure around the reserve in addition to their usual surveys and monitoring. As part of our management plan, they have also been carrying out water vole surveys on site to identify and monitor whether there have been any changes to the wildlife we have around the reserve in the last 5 years.

Out with wildlife, one change that is currently underway is that work has begun on repairing the Sleeping Giant path that leads

over the hill to Lochore Meadow and Ballingry from the reserve. This path was previously badly damaged during a landslide, but repairs are now taking place to rectify and secure the hillside and pathway. Please be aware that the path will be closed from 18 September until mid-November whilst the work is underway, and a diversion will be in place via our Woodland Viewpoint Trail during this time. This route is unfortunately not suitable for cyclists however due to a large number of steps. We apologise for any inconvenience caused during this period but hope this short period of work will make the route much safer in the long-term. Lastly in the world of events, we have a lot of spooktacular events coming up in October with our classic Halloween trail taking place right the way through the month and new Halloween Craft mornings taking place on Sunday 15 October and Saturday 21 October. We also have the return of our Halloween Storytelling evening on Monday 30 October, where we will be making spine-tingling models and creating stories around our creepy characters. Finally, our Discovering Ponds and Discovering Minibeast events are also back on Saturday 14, Tuesday 17 and Thursday 19. # **Farming**



THERE IS CERTAINLY AN autumnal feeling to the days now and the hours of daylight are quickly shortening. Unfortunately there has been quite a bit of rain again which is fairly slowing the progress of finishing off the cereal harvest in 'Newsletter' country and beyond. Here, at Backward farm, we were quite fortunate to get our two fields of spring barley combined towards the end of the nice wee dry spell in late August/early September. Although I was pleasantly surprised by how dry the grain came in, considering how tousled, twisted and downright flattened the crop was, thanks to the rain of late July into August, getting the straw baled in good order for bedding the animals through the winter was always going to be tricky, and so it has proved to be. We got one field baled in moderate order but the other one is still lying as it came out the back of the combine, getting wetter by the day.

I am sure we will get the job done at some point, along with a couple of late fields of silage we still have to make. The quite respectable pile of barley in the shed should easily keep the cattle and pigs fed for the coming year and we might even have some extra to sell which could be a useful extra income. The cattle are getting towards the end of their summer grazing period and although there is plenty of grass to keep them going for a while

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yet it will be the weather conditions which will dictate how long it will be until they are shut back in their sheds once again.

The batch of cattle which graze the field next to the farm steading have access to a shed all summer, and it is interesting to see how they use the building to shelter both from intense sunshine and heat as well as wind and rain. I have started feeding them some silage to supplement their grass since they have started spending a bit more time in the shed.

After the very hot dry days of June, the pigs seemed to have enjoyed the cloudier, more variable weather of the rest of the summer (well I suppose something had to!). There was generally enough moisture to soften the ground slightly and encourage some greenery to grow in their paddocks and, as a bonus to us, they didn't need as much water taken out to them. Additions to the pig herd this summer have been two British Lop sows and a small batch of Berkshire young growing pigs to aim for different markets. The Berkshire is a dark coloured pig with erect ears and is the oldest recorded pig breed in the UK and not so much different from the Saddleback and Tamworth pigs we already keep. The Lop, however is very different as it is pink in colour and looks like a 'normal' pig . They originated from around Tavistock in the Devon/ Cornwall border and are well known for being hardy, good foragers and are well suited for being outdoors. They are also very rare. The two sows each had a litter of piglets in late July and they seem to be growing well and the sows seem to have excellent temperaments. Time will tell how they get on hundreds of miles north of their ancestral homeland.

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#### Gardening



IT'S OFFICIALLY AUTUMN and the sun is blazing in the sky as I'm writing this. After a pretty iffy summer it looks like the weather's going to be more settled for the next wee while... it's about time! As it's now October, this will be the last article of the year, not much to do outside with freezing temperatures and snow.

As I said last time, I thought I would do a round up of the year for this last article. Thinking about it, a 'best for' will work well... please remember, these are my personal experiences and opinions, and other people will definitely have other ones. So here goes.

Best for spring – You can't beat bulbs in the spring. As the shoots start to emerge from the soil in late winter, you know spring is on the way. The kaleidoscope of colours available from crocuses and tulips is amazing and will seriously brighten up pots and borders after a dreary winter. The cheeriness of a daffodil yellow will thaw the hardest of hearts. For spring colour it's bulbs all the way for me.

Best for late spring – I was really impressed with pansies this year it has to be said. That gap between the bulbs and the summer bedding can sometimes be a bit dull, so pansies and polyanthus really perform well. Polyanthus has the added bonus that it will come back year after year too, so buy them once and they'll give joy for years to come. Aubretia (opposite) is also a stunning late spring plant; planted with red tulips it's a sight to behold.

Best for lasting colour – Hands down it has to be nemesia (top right). I bought red plug plants back in the spring and planted them out in pots at the beginning of June. They started flowering about three weeks later and are still going strong. I don't think any other plant in my garden has shown such staying power and resilience during this unstable summer.

Best for being unusual – I've spoken about briza grass earlier in the year and for a long-lasting plant that a bit out of the ordinary, you

can't beat it. Really easy to grow from seed and 'flowers' for months on end. The green seed heads slowly turn a dried grass colour as the season moves on. I would highly recommend it.

Best for hedging – For a temporary hedge (quite tall) to hide the hens' pen this year I've used sunflowers. The variety was 'Val-



entine' which is quite a bushy plant and screens an area off perfectly, as well as sunflowers being their own sort of gorgeous. This variety is about 4-5 feet tall.

Best for impact — Grown en masse, many flowers are stunning. I've always thought rudbeckia (left) were really hard to grow from seed. They're not. As a result, I had masses of them this year and decided to plant a whole load together. The result was better than I could have hoped. Rudbeckia have the added advantage of being a brilliant cut flower too, they have long stems and last for over a week in the house.



Best for bees - As you know, bees are super important for pollinating our food supply, we can't let them die out. I always make sure I have plenty of plants that will attract them, butterflies and hoverflies to the garden. This year I've added Phacelia to the usual array of buddleia, borage and cornflowers. The bees love it... really easy to grow and another excellent cut flower for the house.

Best overall plant – From those I've spoken about here, it has to be the nemesia, a really colourful plant that lasts for ages.

I can't believe I've run out of space, I could have carried on and on with the 'best of', covering a lot more categories. Alas, that's it for this year. I hope you've enjoyed my witterings, pictures and the highs and lows of a season in the garden. Have a good winter folks and I'll see you again when the snows start to melt.


