

Muirs/Lethangie Road Junction


EXPANSION TO BALADO CHICKEN FARM PROPOSED

A PROPOSAL OF APPLICATION notice (PAN) has been submitted to PKC for the Balado Bridge poultry farm, which sits around two miles west of Kinross, to almost double its size.

Amber Real Estates Investments wants to redevelop the farm and to replace the existing 20 buildings with 38 new structures. Poultry sheds would be replaced on existing hardstanding and additional, or widened, sheds would be installed on land currently used for agriculture.

Before submitting a formal planning application, Amber Real Estates is to stage two consultation events at Millbridge Hall in Kinross. These will take place on 7 May and 21 May, both between 1pm and 6pm.

Comments can be made at the event or by writing or emailing the applicant at *Emma.moore@areil.co.uk*. They must be submitted no later than 3 June 2025. Please note that all comments must be sent to the developer to the contact de-



tails stated above and not to PKC. There will be an opportunity to make representations to the Council as and when a formal planning application for the proposal is submitted.

A leaflet drop will be undertaken to the nearest surrounding properties. Councillor

Dave Cuthbert declined to comment as he sits on Perth and Kinross Council's Planning Committee. He said 'If I did comment, then I would need to declare an interest and would then not be able to take part in any discussion or vote on the application, should it come to the committee.'

KHS RECEIVES 'GLOWING' INSPECTION REPORT

Sarah Brown (Headteacher) said, 'This was a real team effort and an example of what can be achieved through hard work, dedication and a shared commitment to educational excellence. Well done to all staff, young people, partners and our school community.'

David Macluskey, Strategic Lead for Education and Learning, said 'I am delighted by this validation of Kinross High School by colleagues from Education Scotland. This is a very strong inspection report. The school is ambitious and has a clear vision for continuous improvement and excellence.'

ALGAL BLOOM: YOU CAN HELP UR LOCH!





Public Consultation: Co-Developing Solutions To Algal **Bloom Problems At Loch Leven**

A group of research scientists from the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology (UK-CEH), James Hutton Institute, Scotland's Rural College and Scottish Agricultural College Consulting who are keen to hear from everyone who interacts with, or is affected by, Loch Leven. This includes, but is not limited to, members of the public, schools, local councillors, community councils, farmers, landowners, wild swimmers and recreational water sports users, walkers, cyclists, anglers, birdwatchers, dog walkers, conservation societies, artists and storytelling groups.

Scotland's lochs deliver important eco-

system services to people and nature. These include flood protection, water supply, food security, recreation, and improved health and wellbeing. If high levels of nutrients our enter our lochs, this affects the natural balance of the system resulting in harmful algal blooms. These blooms, which are often seen as green or brown scums floating on the surface of the water, can kill aquatic life and produce harmful toxins that affect the health of people and animals.

The link between algal blooms and nutrients was first recognised at Loch Leven in the mid 1980s. By the mid 1990s, restoration measures had reduced nutrient inputs to the loch by about 50 per cent and, by the mid 2000s, the loch had returned to good water quality. However,

> in recent years, the loch has experienced a resurgence in algal monitoring blooms; suggests that this change is probably being caused by climate change.

> A spokesperson said, 'To help us understand why this has happened, and to explore how the effects of climate change can be mitigated, we need you to help us co-develop research questions and management options that could improve the water quality of the loch.

Our Science Needs Your Help 'As scientists, we can suggest theoreti-

cal solutions to water quality problems but often we don't understand how the quality of Loch Leven affects the day-today lives of local communities. With algal blooms increasing, again, we are inviting you to help us develop a research strategy to help improve water quality and reduce their impact.


'We are planning to hold a public consultation to co-develop a shared understanding of the causes and effects of water quality problems in the loch, explore possible solutions to those problems and agree the research required to evaluate their effectiveness.

The aims of the meeting are:

- To exchange views on water quality problems at Loch Leven
- To identify sustainable interventions that the community can adopt to help improve water quality
- discuss the creation demonstration projects that would enable scientists and the public to evaluate, jointly, the effectiveness of those interventions

'The meeting will be organised by UKCEH and its collaborators. It will be funded by the UK Natural Environment Research Council and the EU FutureLakes project. We look forward to seeing you!'

Further details and the exact time and location of the meeting will be confirmed in the June issue of the Kinross Newsletter.



KINROSS SCHOOLS RUN TO VICTORY IN CROSS-COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The teams will now advance to the 35th Scottish Schools Athletics Association Cross Country Cham-



pionships, to be held in Kirkcaldy on 26 April.

Well done also to Kinross High School pupils who won the overall High School title at the Championships. A spokesperson said, Pupils demonstrated fantastic motivation, determination and teamwork'. In the team events, their S1 boys, S2 and S3 girls won 1st place, S1 girls and S3 boys took 2nd place and the S2 boys secured 3rd place. COMMUNITIES ACROSS PERTH

and Kinross will this month commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day. Victory in Europe took place on 8 May 1945 when the Allies accepted the unconditional surrender of Nazi Germany.

To mark this anniversary of the end of World War II in Europe, a series of events is planned across Perth and Kinross. On the morning of 8 May, wreaths will be laid at the Veterans' Memorial on St John Street in Perth and at The 51st Highland Division Memorial

VE DAY: 80 YEARS DOWN THE LINE

at the North Inch. That night, a series of VE Day 80 beacons will be lit at seven locations across Perth and Kinross to commemorate the end of the Second World War in Europe.

On Sunday 11 May, there will be a commemorative church service in St John's Church, Perth at 11am, to which all are welcome – no tickets needed. There will also be a display of military vehicles, live music from pipe and brass bands, and other street entertainment, on the streets outside the church. For those unable to attend in person, Caresound Radio will be broadcasting the service live and it will be available on

P&K Provost Xander McDade said: 'Commemorating the 80th anniversary of VE Day allows us to honour the immense sacrifices made by millions of people during World War II. This allows us to reflect on our shared history, educate younger generations about the importance of peace, and express our gratitude to those who fought for our freedom.'

Bailie Chris Ahern, Armed Forces and Veterans Champion for PKC, said: 'This will be a historic occasion and a chance for people across Perth and Kinross to remember the sacrifices made during the Second World War.'

Stephen Leckie, Lord-Lieutenant of Perth and Kinross, added:

'So many people from Perth and Kinross gave their lives in the defeat of the Nazis and other Axis powers in Europe. This is such an important anniversary, and the Lieutenancy is delighted to be working with Perth and Kinross Council and The Black Watch to lay on a series of events on 8 and 11 May for the veterans, those others who lived through the Second World War, as well as the serving armed forces, cadets and general public.

'We encourage you to come along and join us.'



WHERE WILL THE BEACONS BE LIT?



COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN NEEDS *YOU*!

A MAJOR COMMUNITY-LED consultation is about to get underway, to develop a five year Community Action Plan for the future of Kinross. Funding has been provided by Perth & Kinross Council CLLD fund, and community development consultants STAR Development Group have been appointed to guide and support the process.

A Steering Group has been established to manage the project, comprising representatives from a cross section of local groups including Kinross Community Council, Kinross-shire Partnership, KYTHE, Kinross Day Centre, CHAS, KLEO, Greener Kinross-shire, Broke Not Broken, and Kinross-shire Civic Trust.

The consultation will offer lots of ways for everyone who lives or works in Kinross to get involved and have their say.

A household survey is being delivered and collected by teams of local volunteers to homes across the community to find out what people think of the community now, what it could be like in the future, and what they think needs to happen to



make it better. You can also collect and drop off your survey form at Sainsbury's, the Kinross Centre and the library.

The survey is also available online by scanning the QR code above.

There will be meetings with a wide range of interests in the community, including the school, young people, sports groups, environmental and heritage interests, and businesses to find out their views and priorities for action.



The results of all the consultation will be presented back to the community at a fun, drop-in event to be held in at the Millbridge Hall on Saturday 30 August.

POLICE ADDRESS PLAYPARK PHOTO/FILMING CONCERNS

KINROSS COMMUNITY POLICING TEAM say they are aware of 'community tensions' in relation to males allegedly filming in playparks in the Kinross-shire area.

They said, 'We can confirm we have not had any reports of this.

'We are committed to keeping the community of Kinross-shire safe. However, we rely on people to provide us with information in order to carry out appropriate investigation.

'Reports like this are, and will be, thoroughly investigated.

A recent statement from Assistant Chief Constable Catriona Paton commented, 'Given concerns about filming, I would ask people to remind anyone videoing or photographing in public to respect those around them. Police officers balance the rights of people to film with the potential to cause fear or alarm and make decisions based on individual circumstances'

At a recent Kinross Community Council meeting the police were keen to stress that while they would always investigate allegations of this nature, there is currently no evidence of any filming actually having taken place.

In fact, there have been so many reports of this nature throughout the country, there is a strong suggestion that this is an urban myth.

'A police spokeperson said: 'It is not illegal

to take photographs or video footage in public places unless it is for criminal purposes.'



CONFUSION OVER CAR PARK CLOSURE AT BURLEIGH SANDS

NATURESCOT HAVE ISSUED a statement clarifying rumours that Burleigh Sands Car Park is to close over the summer months.

The statement said, 'Loch Leven National Nature Reserve (NNR) is first and foremost a nature reserve and our emphasis is on protecting wildlife while welcoming responsible visitor access.

'Unfortunately, in recent years there have been unsustainable levels of campervan and car camping taking place at the Burleigh Sands car park, with associated issues including toileting, litter, fires and damage to vegetation. This level of damage and disturbance has had a negative impact on the reserve, its wildlife, and the enjoyment of other visitors.

'We are currently considering how we can try and reduce these issues. Partial



closure of the car park overnight during the peak season and/or installation of a height barrier or gate are among potential options, but it's important to stress no decision has yet been taken. We will be discussing options further before reaching a decision and will advise the public of any changes as soon as we can.'





VE DAY IN SCOTLAND

VICTORY IN EUROPE (VE) Day, celebrated on 8 May 1945, marked the end of World War II in Europe and was met with widespread jubilation across Scotland. From bustling cities to tranquil villages, Scots united in heartfelt celebrations, reflecting both relief and joy after years of conflict.

EDINBURGH: A CAPITAL REJOICES

IN EDINBURGH, the announcement of Germany's surrender ignited spontaneous festivities. Even before the official declaration, anticipation filled the air. On 7 May, residents began

gathering materials for bonfires, and by evening, flames illuminated the city. Children in the Old Town, particularly around the Canongate, built large fires near the entrance to Holyrood Palace, where people danced to the tunes of concertinas. The Scotsman newspaper noted that Old Town "bairns" took "full advantage" of the permission to light bonfires.

The following day, 8 May 1945, saw an outpouring of joy in central Edinburgh. Thousands of servicemen and women, factory workers, shop employees, and citizens thronged the streets. Princes Street became a focal point, with crowds singing "Roll Out the Barrel" and Harry Lauder's "Keep Right On to the End of the Road." Outside Register House, jubilant individuals climbed the Duke of Wellington statue, waving to the masses below. The Ross Bandstand in Princes Street Gardens hosted impromptu dances, with couples performing eightsome reels to amplified music.

The celebrations extended over several days. On Thanksgiving Sunday, a parade featuring 3,000 participants—including service members, civil defence workers, and youth organizations—marched along Princes Street, drawing one of the largest crowds the city had ever seen. Street parties flourished in neighbourhoods like Stockbridge, where residents adorned streets with flags and bunting, setting up long tables for communal feasts. One res-

ident recalled, 'The children were all in one street for their tea and in the evening we waltzed in the street.'

GLASGOW: THE CITY GOES 'DAFT WITH JOY'

Glasgow's response to VE Day was equally exuberant. The city erupted in celebration, with George Square becoming the epicentre of festivities. By midday on 8 May, the square was teeming with revellers. Servicemen and women danced to music blaring from the offices of the Daily Record, and ships on the River Clyde sound-

ed their horns in triumph. An estimated 'one-tenth of Glasgow had come to George Square' for the first day of celebrations. The Daily Record described the scene: 'Garlanded with twinkling, coloured fairy lights, George Square was packed with crowds such as it has never seen before.'

Schools were closed, and a two-day holiday declared. Many factories remained open on 8 May, but workers eagerly joined the festivities after their shifts, extending the celebrations over three days. Pubs were so crowded that many ran out of spirits by the evening of 9 May. A 14-year-old resident at the time recalled, "I didn't see too many drunks... There was no need. The spirits were lifted high enough as it was." He recounted joining the celebrations with a companion, noting, "Every street we went through was holding some party or another."

ABERDEEN & THE HIGHLANDS: REFLECTIVE CELEBRATIONS

IN ABERDEEN, the end of the war was embraced with 'a spirit of thanksgiving and quiet joy.' Bonfires, fireworks, and open-air dances marked the occasion.

Fishing vessels sounded their whistles, and in Peterhead, maroons used for calling out the lifeboat crew were fired. The Lord Provost addressed the citizens, acknowledging both the collective relief and the personal losses many had endured.

Further north, in Inverness, church bells rang out for 20 minutes, and the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders' military band

added to the sense of occasion. The Lord Provost of the Highland capital addressed the residents: "We have reached one of the supreme moments in human history. Never, in fact, has there been a moment like it before and pray God there will never be a moment like it again."

Perth and Kinross saw widespread celebrations across both the city and rural communities. In Perth, thousands gathered in the city centre, filling the streets with cheers and patriotic songs. The bells of St John's Kirk rang out in celebration, and bonfires blazed in the evening as residents marked the occasion with street parties. The North Inch became a hub for community festivities, with families gathering for picnics and games.

In Kinross, villagers decorated their homes with bunting, and local halls hosted dances that lasted well into the night. A resident of Kinross recalled.

"It was a night of great excitement, laughter, and a feeling of togetherness. We knew life would never be the same again, but for one night, we just celebrated."

<u>At Dunblane</u>, the cathedral was floodlit for the first time in its 700-year-old history to mark the German surrender.

"The Union Jack floating from its staff underneath the steeple was also illuminated, and the beauty of the ancient building was strikingly revealed - a picture long to be remembered," report in the Stirling Observer said. At night in Stirling, a Victory Dance was held in Victory Hall, where streamers wrapped around the guests who "romped merrily till the early hours" to the rhythm of Tommy Cannon's Dance Band. At 10.30pm, a big crowd gathered in the old cricket ground on New Road where a huge bonfire, with an effigy of Hitler on top, was lit.

A Nation United in Celebration

Across Scotland, VE Day was a tapestry of emotions and events. From the grand parades in major cities to intimate gatherings in rural communities, Scots commemorated the end of a devastating war with a blend of exuberance and reflection. The collective celebrations underscored a shared relief and hope for a peaceful future, honouring both the sacrifices made and the resilience demonstrated throughout the years of conflict.

For VE Day 80 in London, there will be four days of events:

- **5 May:** A military procession from Whitehall, in central London, to Buckingham Palace will be followed by a flypast of current and historical military aircraft, including the Red Arrows; the Cenotaph, on Whitehall, will be draped in Union Jacks, remembering those who died during World War Two; there will be a party on the warship HMS Belfast, on the Thames, and street parties around the country
- 6 May: An installation of ceramic poppies at the Tower of London will mark the anniversary, and historic landmarks across the UK will be lit up
- 7 May: A concert will be held in Westminster Hall, at the Palace of Westminster, in central London
- 8 May: A service will be held in Westminster Abbey and a concert, for 10,000 members of the public, at Horse Guards Parade, in central London

Later in the year, on 15 August, a service led by the Royal British Legion will be held at the National Memorial Arboretum, Staffordshire, to commemorate VJ Day, or Victory in Japan Day, and the end of the war.

AN EVACUEE REMEMBERS

'I WAS AT Eastbank school with my pals one morning without prior knowledge to myself, all the classes in the Primary were lined up and given a packet of sandwiches, a can of condensed milk and a bar of plain chocolate with the instructions that nothing was to be eaten till we were on a moving train. (Strange, I thought!).

Still wondering what was going on, we saw some mothers going up and down the line, bidding a last farewell to their children, then on to the non-corridor train we were herded, and lo and behold when the teacher gave permission to eat our sandwiches none of us had any left!

When we finally reached our destination, the country town of Kinross in Perthshire, we all gathered in the local school and were divided into small groups consisting of brothers and sisters where possible. We then set off in the charge of two adults to be paraded round the town, the adults chapping on the locals' front doors and asking if anyone wanted to take in evacuees from Glasgow, trying not to separate brothers and sisters. This went on all afternoon and just as dusk was falling,my brother and I were the last two in our small group. I mentioned to my brother Ronnie that if we were not accepted we would be sent back to Shettleston — fat chance!

One of the adults knocked on the door of a cottage and an elderly woman appeared. 'Would she like to take these two small brothers, as we were the last of the bunch.' The woman replied 'Oh I suppose so,' and that was that.

The woman, whose name was Mrs Riddoch, a widow with an adult son in the Navy,

and an adult daughter living and working in Edinburgh, proved to be a second mother to us both. She looked after us very well, considering we were total strangers, two boys five and six years old. I'm not sure how long we were evacuated for, at least two years as far as I remember, and great times we had meeting up with our pals again at Kinross school, and where they were billetted. We all spent many happy days together as evacuees and were privileged to be in Kinross, situated in the country next to one of Scotland's beauty spots Loch Leven, and its historic castle. It seemed like no time at all 'til we were all home again in Shettleston after the air raids and threat of them were past. It was back to the usual school days and holiday fun and games.

MARK TAKES UP THE REINS

CONGRATULATIONS TO MARK THOMSON on being elected as President of Kinross-shire Agricultural Society (KAS).

Can you tell us what this means to you? How does it feel?

I am honoured to be President of KAS. The Kinross Show has been part of my life for over 50 years. Even when I was farming in East Fife I always made an effort to attend the show annually, almost like a pilgrimage. My dad (John Thomson) was part of the show committee and a past President, I am proud to follow in his footsteps. As a community we all need to do our bit in order KAS continues to prosper and I like to think of myself as a team player.

How did you get involved with KAS?

When I was school age Dad would take me with him to the show set up and take down when the show was at Kinross House. I might not have been much use at a lot of the tasks but I could take string, rope or posts to the appropriate person. As the years wore on I would help when I could at set up and take down. I have been on and off the show committee since returning to Tillyrie in 1999 from farming in East Fife.

Have you ever exhibited or competed at the show yourself?

Yes. When we were young, mum (Dorothy Thomson) would take my sister Jean and myself to the show with our ponies, from lead reign to fancy dress to attempting to show the ponies and even a wee bit of working hunter classes. We used to show some Blackface sheep for a few years and cross cattle. We still take some cross sheep to the show, albeit they come out the field a day or two before the show. If we get a prize, great, if not, we'll try again next year. It's the taking part and supporting the local show that counts to us.

What is new for this year at the show?

We are privileged to host the Scottish National Show for the Hereford Cattle Society. Plus, some of the light horse classes are being revamped to allow more classes for dif-

fering types of ponies/horses. We are once again delighted that Sarah Rankin will be covering the cooking demonstrations; as we are to Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET) for their assistance in the Education Marquee; and to the people involved in the Memories Marquee of Kinross Shows of the past.

What are you looking forward to most this year?

Three things. Seeing the hard work the committee, convenors and stewards have endured over the months in the lead up to the show coming together on the day; to hear the chat and see the smiles of exhibitors and the public enjoying their day at the show; and for good weather. As I mentioned earlier, it is a team effort that compliments the show and I am a cog within that team.

Can you tell us a bit about yourself, your interests and your farming operations?

When I left Elmwood College in 1986, I worked at Tillyrie milking Ayrshire cows. In 1988, I was fortunate to rent an arable farm near Lundin Links with my father. On 31 October 1991 Kathleen and I were married in Pencaitland Church. Thereafter Rebecca was born 1996 and Fiona 1998. In 1998, when grain prices were down to around £70 per tonne and we had a rent review, we gave our 12 month notice to end the rental agreement. We came back to Tillyrie in November 1999. I also worked for a land and estate agent (McCrae & McCrae) from 2003 to 2007; 2007 till June 2009 I worked alongside dad with a roller mill and fencing contractors. Whilst employed away from the farm, I still worked with the suckler cows and organised the arable cropping.

Since June 2009 I have been running the family farm at Tillyrie. Over the last three years my two daughters (Rebecca & Fiona)

have been invaluable in working alongside myself. We have a herd of 90 Luing & Simmental cattle calving in April/May; 450 cross ewes lamb lambing March/early April; approximately 40 acres of spring barley; 35 acres rented out for vining peas; 70 acres in woodland; and the remaining lands are in grass for grazing and silage.

I was fortunate to play rugby for Kinross (1984-86, 2000-2014), Edinburgh Wanderers (1986-1992, 1993-1995), Dunfermline (1992-1993), Kirkcaldy (1995-2000), and District rugby for North & Midlands (1990-1995). I still enjoy watching games whenever I can, whether it being local or going to Murrayfield.

I had a lot of years in good (and bad) company with Kinross JAC, being in the winning tug of war team that won at the Highland Show 1990.

I am proud to have been chairman (2020-2022) of the Luing Cattle Society, and a board member for 9 years. I still enjoy promoting the breed, whether at the Royal Highland Show (where we have supplied pairs of Luing & Sim/Luing bulling heifers for the last 4 years) and travelling to the Royal Welsh Show with fellow breeders.

Anything else you wish to share?

For the Show, we are indebted to all the sponsors, exhibitors, stand & stall holders, the show committee, and members of the public that make the day of Kinross Show possible.

On a personal note, the camaraderie, straight talking and graft that the present and past show committees have given to the Kinross-shire Agricultural Society has been a delight to be part of. As we near the 195th Kinross Show on 9 August 2025, the planning goes on and the excitement grows.

RAINGARDENS INNOVATIONS

THE MAN BEHIND THE idea of making the Kinross Raingardens Trail, Brian D'Arcy, has now introduced his latest invention to reduce pressure on Waste Water Treatment Works (WWTW). And the first user of the invention is a Kinross business!

Much of the town's rainwater drains into a combined sewage network, so when there is a lot of rainfall, this can result in flooding and sewage overspills.

Just as the Kinross Raingardens Trail aims to reduce the occurrence of sewage overspills by reducing pressure on WWTW, so the SuDSPod creation seeks to further assist water management.


The SuDSPod works by taking rainfall from roofing and bypassing it through a planted trough and filtration bed before the water joins the waste water system. In this way, good use is made of the water by sustaining plants whilst at the same time slowing down the rate at which the reduced amount of water joins the waste water system.

With a grant from Perth and Kinross Countryside Trust, Koronka Manufacturing is the first site of three of these attractive planters which can be used in both commercial and

domestic settings. Brian's idea has become a reality through development with GreenBlue Urban of Sussex.



Like the Raingardens Trail, anything that either stops or slows down surface water helps the environment. Since the work carried out at the Kinross Park & Ride, there has been no flooding, with most water now draining into the central grassy wildflower area of the Park & Ride rather than down the drains!

Similarly, the SuDSPod planter has been tested at Hull University with the chart (pictured) showing the very significant drop in Peak Outflow to the drains. Whilst Kinross hosts these first three planters, as more arrive in Scotland this soft engineering form of water management will help

reduce water reaching the drains.

Road Safety Projects: Many people ask what is happening to the long list of safety projects agreed to be put in place throughout Kinross-shire. The answer is, very little. Perth and Kinross Council, like every Scottish local authority, has



been instructed by the Scottish government to prioritise the introduction of their Pavement Parking Ban Legislation and the 20mph zones in our villages and town at the expense of all other road safety works. It is hoped that these works should be largely finished by the end of this year. We will then (hopefully) be able to get back to the over 120 outstanding road safety requests waiting to be actioned.

Grow Wild: I have been contacted by many people asking what is proposed with the Council's Grow Wild scheme for amenity areas. You will have noticed signs advising of the changes in many of our open spaces. I have to say I have major reservations about leaving large uncut areas in places like parks where children play. I would be very wary about allowing children to play in these long uncut grass areas because of the risk of dog excrement and ticks. I asked what instructions have been given to Council staff who are implementing the scheme and was told the following;

- 1. Play areas, cut in and around play areas including a boundary (Minimum 5m, Where possible)
- 2. Sport areas, cut all pitches including a boundary (Minimum 5m, where possible)
- 3. Events area, cut any areas that are used for Galas, fairs, school sports and general events.
- General Amenity areas, cut any general kick around areas, picnic areas and high use areas.
- Cut all fence lines, path and road edges, boundaries. Cut around bins, seats and keep signs clear to read. Cut all

- access paths and roads, private access paths and access to buildings (Pavillions, sheds, changing rooms etc) Make sure all sight lines around corners are cut.
- 6. Small areas of grass, cut path/road edges, boundaries etc. If one or two more bouts would finish area, cut it. Do not leave grass area with long narrow areas of uncut grass (Mohicans) or with small tufts of grass.
- 7. Leave uncut: Under trees and around groups/lines of



trees, out to the edge of the trees canopy. The remainder of the grass area would be left for Grow Wild with desire lines and dog walking paths through it as required.

Link Path, From Pier To High Street: The link path from The Pier to Bridgend is now very difficult for people on disability scooters or our Kinross Trishaws to use. The vegetation requires cutting back and the tree roots removed to make the path usable. I have asked the Criminal Justice Department to consider using people carrying out their Community Service Orders to improve the path so everyone can use it. They have promised to see what can be done.



Visit to CHAS at Rachel House

IT WAS A pleasure to meet with CHAS CEO Rami Okasha at Rachel House and hear more about plans to upgrade the hospice. I was also given a tour of the current facility, which continues to provide vital



support to children and families during the most challenging of times. Opened in the early 1990s as Scotland's first children's hospice, Rachel House is now one of the largest employers in Kinross. While it has served the community exceptionally well, the building is now in need of modernisation. The proposed



redevelopment will bring major improvements, including a modest expansion of the existing footprint. These changes will be subject to planning consent, and Rami and his team are actively engaging with the wider community as part of that process.

Proposed Traffic Lights at Muirs/Loch Leven Campus

I RECENTLY MET with Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) officers on-site following concerns raised by local residents about the proposed installation of traffic lights at the junction beside the campus. Temporary lights in place recently have highlighted how busy this junction can become. There is a strong view locally that either a roundabout or maintaining the current layout would be preferable. However, the developer Persimmon Homes is subject to a long-standing planning condition, linked to nearby housing development consent, requiring them to install traffic lights at this location. The only way to amend this would be for Persimmon to formally apply to PKC to vary the condition. A roundabout, while popular in theory, would be considerably more expensive. Local ward councillors are in agreement that the preferred course of action would be to retain the current layout and explore whether the funds earmarked for the traffic lights could be redirected to a more pressing local upgrade. This option is being investigated further by council officers in discussion with Persimmon.

Kinross-shire Committee Development Workshop

MEMBERS OF THE Kinross-shire Committee — including ward councillors and representatives from local community councils — recently took part in a development workshop to review the committee's work over recent years and consider its future role. The committee is unique within Perth and Kinross Council as the only local ward committee currently operating (although others have been proposed, none have been established to date). I continue to support the committee, which has helped to strengthen collaboration between community councils and provided a valuable platform for local engagement with PKC officers. It also offers an opportunity to take a strategic approach to issues affecting the wider Kinross-shire area. One function the committee has not fully exercised is its ability to feed into other PKC committees on matters that affect Kinross-shire. Strengthening this role was agreed as a priority going forward.

South Kinross Flood Protection Scheme Update

THE SOUTH KINROSS Flood Protection Scheme (FPS) is a vital initiative aimed at enhancing our community's resilience



to flood risks. Following recurring flooding events around the South Queich, most recently in February and August 2020, the flood scheme was officially published in March 2023. However, it encountered objections from two landowners. Despite multiple rounds of correspondence and meetings, the council has faced challenges in fully resolving these objections.

After preliminary confirmation of the scheme in December 2024, an independent reporter was appointed by the Scottish Government's Planning and Environmental Appeals Division (DPEA) to lead the Local Authority Hearing.

The reporter is currently in the information-gathering phase, during which required documentation and details about the objectors are being submitted to facilitate further deliberations. This process is expected to last approximately 12 weeks, with the hearing anticipated toward the end of May or early June 2025.

Should the reporter's decision be favorable, the scheme will proceed to final confirmation, with or without modification, at the Climate Change and Sustainability Committee meeting scheduled for 20 August 2025, or the nearest suitable decision-making committee. Following this, the council will transition into the Detailed Design phase, leading up to construction, which is expected to begin in early 2028.

The Local Authority Hearing will hopefully be available for public viewing online. An announcement on the confirmed date will be made closer to the time, allowing interested parties to observe the proceedings.

EV Charging Network Expansion Across Perth, Kinross, and Angus


PERTH AND KINROSS and Angus Councils have secured a £1.925 million grant for EV charging infrastructure funding from the Scottish Government's £30 million Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Fund. This fund aims to deliver a high-quality, accessible EV charging network across Scotland, with projects under it expected to attract at least £30 million in additional private investment. This marks a critical step in Scotland's transition to greener transport and enhances Perth and Kinross' journey towards sustainability.

The councils have unveiled plans for a significant upgrade to the electric vehicle (EV) charging network, aimed at improving access to reliable charging points for motorists, particularly those without off-street parking, in both urban and rural areas.

Perth and Kinross Council will oversee the procurement process and project delivery, ensuring a comprehensive rollout across both regions. The project will involve the installation and maintenance of new and existing EV chargers, supported by a 15-20 year contract. A dedicated back-office team will manage the network, covering tariff collection, usage data, payments, and maintenance.

The total funding for the project stands at £2.205 million, including £280,000 allocated for EV strategies and procurement. Contracts are set to go out to tender this summer, with project delivery expected to begin in Autumn 2025. This initiative aims to establish a comprehensive charging network throughout Kinross-Shire and Glenfarg.

AS YOU MIGHT expect, I was delighted that my outdoor education bill has passed stage one at Holyrood with crossparty support. This Bill is not about party politics, it is what is in the best interests of our young people. In this vein, I am grateful to all of the MSPs who backed the principles of the legislation from Labour,



the Liberal Democrats, the Greens and the SNP backbenchers who bravely broke ranks.

For readers who aren't aware, I am currently progressing with a Private Members Bill through Holyrood which seeks to give every child in Scotland the right to one week of residential outdoor education. Far too many young people are missing out on this key learning opportunity at present, and this is especially the case in the most deprived areas. Over the last three years I have been appalled at the lack of data the Scottish Government holds on outdoor education, but our estimates are that only a third of children are attending residentials during their time at school.

In the independent school sector this is built into the curriculum because the evidence shows how beneficial it is for developing key life skills such as confidence and resilience. The current model is not working and I don't believe it is fair, or acceptable, that the opportunity to attend a residential be reserved for a select minority in a postcode lottery. This is especially the case because it is often those from the most challenging backgrounds who gain the most from residential outdoor education.

The evidence for the benefits of residential outdoor education is compelling and exactly what is needed to begin addressing the considerable challenges in Scottish education such as attendance, behaviour, discipline, anxiety and mental health in the aftermath of Covid. Outdoor education will not solve this problem alone, but we know from qualitative evidence from pupils and teachers how beneficial, even life-changing, it can be. Often young people can be hesitant and a bit daunted prior to attending residentials, but come away with a sense of achievement and revitalised self-esteem.

I would like to thank parliamentary colleagues again for proactively engaging with me throughout the process over the last three years, but most especially the outdoor education sector themselves. Not many Member's Bills make it this far in the process and it is a credit to the sector for persuasively putting forward the transformational impact residential experiences can have on youngsters.

The next months of Stage 2 will be crucial in addressing the concerns of members, shaping this legislation and ensuring inclusivity for all. Holyrood backing the Bill at Stage 1 is just the beginning, but the momentum is now with us, and I am absolutely determined to see it through for the sake our young people.

WE ARE AT THE tail end of the wild garlic season, but if you know where to look you'll still find a few leaves knocking around. Scottish asparagus season is also upon us and as it's woefully short, I urge you to get involved and eat this absolutely delicious vegetable as often as possible until the season ends early next month.

The beautifully tender shoots are utterly delicious, grown just up the road near Coupar Angus and they are far superior in flavour to any of the weeks-old South American stuff you can get in the supermarket year-round. Seasonality matters, as does supporting British farming, so get asparagus on the menu as

much as you can over the next few short weeks and then look forward to its return next March.

The pesto will work with basil, or a mix of basil and spinach if you can't get hold of wild garlic, but if you come across some, the flavour is absolutely next level!



ASPARAGUS WITH WILD GARLIC PESTO

Serves four as a starter:

2 bundles of Dehead Farms asparagus

250g of wild garlic - about half a carrier bag full

150g blanched hazelnuts

1 clove garlic

300ml Scottish rapeseed oil

50g finely grated parmesan or grana padano

Sea salt

Black pepper


Pick your wild garlic using a knife, as pulling it by the roots means it won't grow back next year. Wash it thoroughly using a salad spinner, or under running cold water in a colander. Remove any of the flower buds and reserve those for later, as they make a great zingy pickle.

Chop finely and add to a mortar and pestle. Toast the hazelnuts in a dry pan until they just start to change colour then roughly chop and add to the chopped wild garlic. Add some salt and a little of the oil and grind to crush the nuts further and add in the crushed garlic clove. Add the rest of the oil, grind again then stir in the cheese.

Gently cook your asparagus for just 2 – 3 minutes just before you want to eat. Lay on a platter, scatter with sea salt and spoon over your wild garlic pesto.

To make the pickled wild garlic buds, simply warm up 100ml white wine vinegar with 25ml elderflower syrup, ½ tsp mustard seeds, 1 star anise, ½ tsp coriander seeds and a slice of lemon peel.

When just simmering, remove from the heat and set aside to infuse and cool a little. After 5 minutes, strain and add the wild garlic buds. Decant into a sterilised jar. Lovely to add crunch and a hit of acidity to your salads.

PLASTIC: WHAT CAN BE DONE

ABOUT IT?

IN 1939, JOHN MCCONNELL was working in the research laboratory of a plastics factory in Los Angeles. He quickly realised that this wonderful new material, plastic, could also have the not-so-wonderful potential to pollute land and waterways. Thirty years later, he proposed an Earth Day – a day to honour our planet, to plant a tree or do a litter pick, some small thing to show our appreciation for what nature does for us. Never could he have foreseen, that today in the UK, we would be throwing away 1.7 billion pieces of plastic a week (four double decker buses full a minute).

Plastics have gone from simple Bakelite to an array of complex substances, the manufacture of which now involves thousands of chemicals. According to 'Chemicals in Plastics', the UN's environmental programme's technical report for 2023, 3,200 of these chemicals have one or more 'hazardous properties of concern'. Women are susceptible at certain periods of

their life, as are the foetus and child with their vulnerable developing nervous systems. Men are not excluded, with particular chemicals affecting fertility. Plastics also release toxins as they degrade and so even at the end of their life, they are not inert materials.

So how can we retain the benefits of plastic but attenuate the more negative properties? Does recycling help? Possibly not hugely. Ultimately, recycling postpones the day plastics reach land-fill. What I mean is, that for those plastics that can be recycled, there is a limited number of times they can be deconstructed and reconstituted and a limited percentage of impurities that can be tolerated without altering their visual appearance or plastic properties. Some plastics are downcycled, eg to make bin bags, so although a kind



Would decreasing our plastic consumption help? Definitely, and not just our personal consumption but that of the industries around us, about which we have very little say. However we can exert some influence. Activist groups such as Greenpeace, do frequently look for signatures for petitions to add weight to their arguments. A Global Plastics Treaty is being formulated at the moment. It is a drawn out process, but petitions give impetus to those negotiating on our behalf. Nationally we can also exert influence. As our green targets slip beyond their deadlines, or we spend time to reinvent the wheel rather than adopt tried and tested protocols from other countries, do let your MP or MSP know! It is informative for our policy makers to have a measure of the concern among their constituents about climate change issues.

That concern is real, for some an anxiety, for some an almost paralysing anxiety which sees no point in doing anything. But there are things we can do as individuals which can redirect this fatalism for a better local environment.

How would it look if we took along our own mug for a takeaway coffee, or as a small token, declined the plastic lid to go on the disposable cup? Could we buy anything in bulk to reduce the plastic packaging? Could we buy unwrapped fruit and vegetables from the butchers or local farm shops? Could we use a refill shop? (And here I have to declare my interest as I own one!). Could we ditch our single use water bottle? And there could be many other suggestions.

So if you didn't manage to celebrate Earth Day on 22 April this year, choose another day, any day, to do something a little kind for our planet. Earth Day will be on 22 April next year and in the years to come. It feels good to be positive and give the Earth a helping hand. Every little helps!

of recycling, they are already just one stop from landfill. We know from The Big Plastic Count last year that 58% of our plastics are incinerated (up from 46% from previous Plastic Count in 2022), a process that releases more CO2 per tonne than burning coal.

Only 17% of our plastics are recycled, partly because we don't have enough recycling facilities. It may be telling that the UK is planning more incinerators than recycling plants. A group, Everyday Plastics, in 2024, placed trackers in soft plastic collections from supermarkets. Disappointingly 70% were incinerated, not recycled. These collection schemes may actually encourage us to subconsciously increase our plastic waste as their existence reassures us that we are being planet- friendly. By focusing on the recycling problem, perhaps our eyes are being diverted from the real crux of the matter – too much plastic!

RETURN FROM ETHIOPIA

WINNING WAYS by Jo Middlemiss

AS MY FAITHFUL READERS know, this column is called Winning Ways. Unfortunately the wins in the following article are there, but a bit thin on the ground! My last article ended with the words 'there are two weeks of surprises ahead of us'. Those turned out to be prophetic words.

My 15th month long trip to Bucamma Health Centre was as exciting, interesting and fulfilling as ever. I love our visits, and we are loved and appreciated in return.

Our laden suitcases, with all the gifts of socks, pants, bandages etc were well received, and we were able to see that the plans that we share with them and help fund, are being successfully put in place. We were even able to discuss our future and succession plans.

So far, so routine. One day, in the middle of the month, I noticed that the nail of my big

toe was bothering me. Nothing serious at all, but I soaked it in hot salty water. One of the staff had a look and, shock horror, there was a worm in my toe. They kindly dug it out, I took a picture of the little wriggler, (very common apparently and only likes toes.) An antibiotic was decided upon, as the toe was a bit sore and angry looking. So far, so unremarkable. Toe healed and the work continued.

Leaving is always heartbreaking, and this year was no exception. I was very much looking forward to coming home, as we had great family plans ahead to celebrate our 50th wedding anniversary, and a big family reunion in SE Asia.

There is a saying 'God smiles while we make plans'. I wasn't feeling 100% on the flight home. I put it down to a head cold, and jet lag. But gradually over the next few days, I started to turn yellow, and develop an excruciating itch. A liver problem? Then followed blood tests for all the illnesses one might contract in Africa. Every test came back negative; what could it possibly be? A few days in hospital came up with no answers, until someone asked the name of the antibiotic I took for the rogue toe. Extraordinarily that antibiotic, augmenton, causes liver upset in 1 in 100,000 people. Sadly for me, it was decided that that was me, just unlucky. Go home, you'll get better, albeit



slowly. I went home to recuperate, and still very determined to go on our long arranged holiday to Thailand!

I did not get better, I got worse. It came in waves -one moment I was drenched in sweat, the next I was shivering uncontrollably under every blanket I could find. My joints ached, my stomach turned, and every muscle felt like it was fighting a war of its own. More yellow, terrible and very worrying night sweats and shakes. More blood tests showed the numbers going badly in the wrong direction - rushed to Ninewells again. Soaring temperature and alarm bells ringing. Malaria diagnosed and some other infection still to be identified. The worm and the augmenton were terrible 'red herrings'. I must have been bitten, although I never saw a mosquito.

Ninewells were magnificent once the malaria made itself known. Apparently, this type only shows up during times of high fever. Suffice to say, I was very seriously and worryingly ill. Drips, lines, catheter and oxygen .Scans and ultra sounds all came my way. Four different types of anti biotic were administered. That malaria didn't have a chance! I cannot say enough about the special nursing I received in Ward 42 and the High Dependency ward. I was loved and cared for in a way that was probably routine for them, but amazing for me.

Calm, caring, professional, delightful staff - all of them . One of the night nurses - just a young girl – sat up with me most of one night as I shivered and shook, feeling freezing, but was actually burning up, telling me I was going to be fine and she was there for me - very humbling. She liked one of my Ethiopia bracelets, and so I left it for her as I was discharged, to keep. Even the top nurse in High Dependency had never had a malaria patient before, so I became a medical celeb!

Recovery from malaria is not instant. Even as the parasite is killed off, your body has to deal with the damage left behind —especially if, like me, you got to treatment late. My liver function was impaired. My red blood cell count had plummeted. I was sleeping 18 to 20 hours a day, waking only to eat a few bites of bland food or to try and shuffle my way to the bathroom

My illness has obviously shocked and surprised friends and family. I have been inundated with cards, flowers, gallons of soup (thanks Broom Rd and Kinross team!), food supplies, and good wishes. I have experienced huge waves of sadness, gratitude and humility. I am home and have been told to rest. I must take my recovery seriously and slowly. I don't have much choice — I get weary after very little effort. Incidentally, we didn't go to Thailand!

Malaria is still one of the most devastating diseases in the world. Despite being preventable and treatable, it kills over 600,000 people every year – mostly children in sub-Saharan Africa. My case was serious, but survivable, thanks to access to excellent care back home.


I now understand how fragile that balance is. Not everyone has the resources or connections to make it out of their remote villages and into a decent hospital. Many don't have access to even the most basic anti malarial treatments. My experience was a reminder of how unequal the world remains in terms of healthcare.

Sunday is Easter Day and I am going to St Paul's to say a very big Thank You for life and love and good health.

Kinross-shire Committee Update: The Chair had sent an update in his absence which the Treasurer relayed. The Chair had been unable to attend the most recent meeting but ClIr L Hatch had agreed to attend as a regular attendee, with A Clark volunteering to attend as a sub. ClIr W Robertson to send contact details. ClIr W Robertson confirmed the 20/02/25 KLC meeting did go ahead and there were a number of items discussed: P&K wide Visitor Levy: to apply across all P&K hotels, campsites and BnB, and currently going out to consultation, come back for consultation in Autumn 2025 probably. There was also a transport update and some verbal reports on Road Safety from PKC Officers.

Road Safety Action Update: K Donaldson reported that the B9097 road surface is becoming increasingly badly potholed with road surface getting particularly bad from Vane Farm to Righead. Also the section of the C40 towards Ballingry. W Robertson wasn't able to give any info on a date for reparation but agreed with K Donaldson's comment and offered to raise this as an issue at the next PKC Road safety meeting in April. Cllr J Hornal questioned the latest police report referencing the absence of any "speeding reports" from Portmoak and should residents escalate complaints? Secretary to raise question to Police Liaison what is the definition of a "speeding report" and to clarify the process of what info. is required and how to report speeding complaints.

Scotlandwell To Portmoak Church Path: The Chair had reported an outreach from the landowner. Initial discussions had been made with PKC Officer D Stubbs. Further face to face meeting on 17/03/25. This is clearly a positive development and will be reported at PCC April meeting. Cllr W Robertson confirmed forthcoming meeting on Mon 17/03/25 between D Stubbs, A Miller and the Landowner.

Play Facilities At Scotlandwell Green: Chair had updated in advance work is now well advanced on the play facility renewal and upgrade. It is hoped that the facility will be opened and commissioned by the next PCC April meeting.



Portmoak Church - Future For The Church And Car Park: updates had been received from both the Chair and Kinnesswood Development Trust (KDC) on this item. Ongoing discussions were taking place regarding the possible purchase of the car park from Church of Scotland (CoS). This was being led by KDC. KDC have requested confirmation as to the extent of any PKC involvement prior to KDC expending what will be a lot of time completing Scottish Land Fund applications. There is a fairly tight timescale for their process over the next few months into beginning of Jun 25 and then a decision possibly in Sep 25, though there are still uncertainties that could mean a decision being delayed until Nov 25. If successful, funds would be released when missives are exchanged/agreed. There is no guarantee that SLF funding will continue after that due to forthcoming elections. KDC have not yet heard back from CoS regarding their valuation of the car park but note they will also have to amend all the land titles etc. Depending on the valuation there will likely be an initiative to raise some funds locally from the Community. Cllr W Robertson suggested that to avoid a burden on the Community, that once acquired the carpark maintenance be handed over to PKC.

PKC Query On Membership Status For K Donaldson: Secretary had clarified with PKC that it is not mandatory to have a Vice-Chair, PCC just need another Member to step up if Chair is absent. The issue with a non-elected member being Chair is that if there is a decision or vote then they are not officially allowed to preside. Secretary to have co-option nomination forms resubmitted to co-opt K Donaldson to PCC and then at next PCC AGM, K Donaldson can be elected as a full member of PCC.

Portmoak Gala Update: A Clark is on Gala Committee. Reported that the Committee are really active, and really motivated. A Clark is organising a Raffle, and prizes needed. Volunteers are still needed for set up before, and take down the following day. Raffle prizes are needed if any businesses or individuals would like to contribute. Raffle tickets are being printed available from Portmoak Primary School, Kinnesswood Village Shop, and via Committee Members to friends and neighbours.

Loch Leven Half Marathon: Reminder of the forthcoming event, Sun 11 May 2025, 0845 – 1200 approx. Road closure is official notification via PKC so residents are reminded that they should plan ahead around the race times. Secretary had met with President of Kinross Road Runners and was to send round updated info to Portmoak Community Facebook, and PCC subscriber list. PCC requests that drivers do respect the road closure for this long running and increasingly popular local event.

Progress with Developments

It was agreed that CC would ask PC Samson if he could put their cardboard police person around our district. This topic will be discussed at the next Kinross-shire committee meeting where CC will seek an update on the speedwatch initiative led by Milnathort CC. Cllr Robertson advised there were still issues with Police completing paperwork.

Windfarms: The CC has been approached by Strachan CC regarding Galileo and our objection to windfarms. The CC has sent them a link to our website where our responses are.

LPP Review And Discussion: The LPP was submitted to PKC on Friday 28th March 2025. Once it has been checked by PKC for compliance with regulations and formally registered CC will post it on the Fossoway Trust website.

Community Development Trust (CDT): The Trust is in the process of finalising the design and printing of the Community Action Plan.

Road Safety in FDCC, including A977 mitigation measures: Cllr Robertson reported that PKC do not have any resources to carry out any road safety work until 2026 as they are fully occupied completing the implementation of the new 20mph speed limits and prohibition of parking on pavements. The CC wanted it noted that they were extremely disappointed with this position and feel it is totally unacceptable.

Corb Bridge Culvert (on the B934 in Dunning Glen): Will be closed for nine weeks from 2nd June 2025 for bridge strengthening works.

Portmoak Community Woodland Group

There has been intense restoration activity on the Portmoak Moss peat bog, with a number of volunteer days involving local people and helpers from further afield.

We have adopted a two pronged approach. On one of the days we covered a wide area, to ensure that any new saplings were pulled out. With six people about 6,000 square metres were cleared from a section of the Moss that had been cleared twice before; effectively a weeding job.

On the next occasion, we concentrated on a smaller area, where it was tough work to extricate longer-established trees from the peat. This event involved staff from the Scottish Environment Protection Agency, who kindly chose to help us on one of their corporate volunteering days. This time nine people cleared 600 square metres of dense and tall trees.

Finally, we welcomed a dozen members of the Lothians Conservation Volunteers. They brought a diverse group of people from the other side of the Forth and continued the tough work on the re-profiled slopes, close to the main steps.

Anyone walking that way will see how effective the work has been. We hope that, by removing the trees, we have created the right conditions for the rare sphagnum moss to spread. Portmoak Community Woodland Group would like to say a big thank you to everyone who came along.

Now it's time to relax a bit and enjoy the bird life. Watch out for meadow pipits nesting amongst the heather and green woodpeckers who often fly along the tree line.

If you would like to have an expert, guided tour please join us at 7am on Saturday 10 May at the entrance to Portmoak Moss, when Scott Paterson will take us round and help us to identify, by sight and sound, the many birds which sing at that time of day. No, it's not a dawn chorus, which would involve a much earlier start but judging by previous walks it will be brilliant. be an opportunity, as we move forward, to have dialogue around this initiative with other Kinross and Kinross-shire environmental groups.



Milnathort in Bloom

25 Years of Growing Together

This year marks 25 years since Milnathort in Bloom began. What started with a few hanging baskets, filled with plants from the ironmongers and watered using a barrel in a wheelbarrow, has developed into a regular village-wide effort to maintain and enhance public planting. Volunteers continue to meet throughout the year to prepare, plant, and maintain displays. These include tubs, beds, baskets and planters that change with the seasons. Spring displays give way to summer planting, then are replaced ahead of the colder months. All the work is carried out by volunteers who give their time to keep the village looking well cared for.

Support from local funders has helped improve the group's ability to deliver. A contribution from Giacopazzi's and the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Trust allowed the group to purchase a small vehicle to assist with watering and plant transport. A large polytunnel, provided with the permission of June and Rob at Hattonburn, is now used to grow plants and prepare baskets for the village displays. This has reduced costs and improved the group's capacity to plan ahead and grow to scale.

This year also brings a loss. Graeme Stewart, a long-serving volunteer, died earlier in 2025. Graeme was responsible for the heather garden on Old Perth Road, the bed at Whyte Place, and the flower border at the War Memorial. His work and commitment were valued by everyone in the group. His absence will be noticeable throughout the growing season.

To help continue the work Graeme undertook, Milnathort in Bloom is asking for volunteers to consider adopting a flower bed or patch. It does not need to be a large time commitment. Occasional weeding and tidying are often enough to maintain an area to a high standard. Anyone living near one of the beds or interested in gardening is encouraged to get in touch either via Facebook or by speaking with a volunteer. Full support is available, and all help is welcomed.

This spring, the group has planted hundreds of plug plants in



After many years of use by Milnathort in Bloom, exposure to weather had caused it to deteriorate to the point of being unsafe. Attempts to maintain it had delayed the inevitable, but eventually it could no longer be used.

With no available funds for a replacement, the group contacted local businesses for help. Several expressed interest but were not in a position to commit. Later in the year, John Ross and his team at Kinross Wooden Products offered to take on the cart as a winter project. The offer was accepted, and work took place over the winter months. The cart is now fully restored and ready to return to service in the 2025 programme.




The group would like to thank Kinross Wooden Products for their time and contribution. This support from local businesses makes a tangible difference to what the group is able to deliver.

Broke not Broken

Over the past few months we have been incredibly busy. Over the Easter holidays we ran two Tuesday trips with one coachload attending each trip. Previously we have been able to have two coachloads but a significant funding decrease for this project meant that we had a long waiting list for each day. The trips were very successful and everyone enjoyed the day. Each trip includes transport, food (breakfast and lunch) and entrance tickets.

We have also had a refresh of our approach to food support, suspending voucher-use for three months. Moving back to food parcels only has enabled us to increase contact with people accessing this support, and staff have been having more in depth contact, working with people to access other financial support or agencies. People have been living in crisis for longer and longer due to circumstances beyond their control. We have been struggling to maintain this long term level of support, as we were initially designed to meet short term crisis support. We hope to return to voucher support but with a different structure to enable us to sustain this.

We have also sent out a charity wide survey to everyone who has accessed any of our projects over the past year. For a reminder here is a list of all the projects that we ran:

Foodbank, school uniform bank, women's group, toddler group, advice hub, counselling support, energy payments, winter clothing payments, winter warmer parcels, Christmas hampers, Tuesday Trips.

Last year we ran two one-off projects as well, a summer uplift for all families using our projects and a swimming skills project in partnership with Live Active. After sending out over 270 texts with links to the survey, we have had around a 20% response, which is good, and will be working on the results over the next few months.

After an AGM in February we are excited to welcome some fantastic new trustees. Thanks to everyone who was interested and we will be welcoming the new faces over the next few months after they have shadowed a couple of trustee meetings and know what they are getting in to!

We held our first business lunch inviting local businesses to come

and find our more about what we do and ways we can work in partnership. We also held an awareness raising event with the fantastic Andy's Mans Club, and are working with Enable to run a get together to support local families with children with additional support needs.

Why these two things? Well we know that households with any disability will be more likely to be living in poverty as they face higher costs, and are more likely to have lower incomes. We also know that living on a low income, or in poverty, has a huge impact on mental health. So we wanted to work with these two partner organisations to link in and support people in Kinrossshire. Andy's Man Club meets every Monday at the campus.

Locally, we continue to attend the anti poverty taskforce led by the council and Third sector interface, PKAVS. We are also now involved with the local Community Action Plan for Kinross. Nationally over the past few months we have attended The Gathering in Glasgow, Scottish Parliament and an event with the first Minster. We also welcomed Jim

Fairlie MSP to our food bank and shared with him a list of asks and concerns that we had regarding the additional costs people be re-homed into housing associations and council owned tenancies, as we had seen an upsurge in referrals for people in these circumstances.

We continue to advocate for the structural changes that are needed to improve the lives of people experiencing poverty in our area, including changing eligibility criteria for accessing financial support, understanding the rural poverty premium, the importance and impact of a cash first approach.

We continue to do this with the support of funders, people donating food time and money, and our dedicated volunteers, trustees and staff. Thanks to them all and to The Gannochy Trust, Robertson Trust, who have recently re-committed to funding us over multiple years, and for recent funding from Virgin Unite,

SSEN and Westfield Community Fund. We were also delighted to visit Glenfarg Guild as well as Read and Relax who both gave us donations. It is great to be part of such a supportive community.




done to Charlotte – this was her final SNAGS, after qualifying for 4 consecutive years.

Robin's Nest



WE ARE WELL AND truly into spring here at Loch Leven, with more and more plants coming into flower by the day, and more insects seen out and about. Our fantastic insect volunteers continue to survey Burleigh and the old railway line. In April we saw lots of buff-tailed bumble bees, as well as an early bumble bee and a carder bee. In May we'll start to see damselflies and a great place to spot them is at Burleigh ponds.

In April we completed our first duck count on St Serf's Island. We counted nesting mallards, as well as recording any goose nests on the island. This was a great effort by fellow NatureScot staff and our volunteers, as they'll know from experience transecting St Serf's isn't easy! We also saw our first broods of young on the loch as well. We have been finding more and more birds nests around the reserve while working and even found a robin's nest in an old BBQ.

Ducks and geese here nest on the ground on islands and on the shores of the loch, and once hatched the sheltered shorelines provide excellent habitat and protection from predators.

This is a great reminder for those visiting the reserve to please follow local guidance and SOAC. We ask for water users to stay 200m from the shoreline and islands, and that there are no

fires/fire bowls or BBQs used on the nature reserve. SOAC recommends using a small gas camping stove.

We would also ask people to stay on the footpaths and not go over fences, especially with dogs, as these areas are fenced off purely to protect the wildlife here.

In April we welcomed back previous seasonal reserve officer Stuart, and this month we have two more starting, Bella and Chris. They will be working all through the week including weekends, so if you ever see them around please don't hesitate to stop for a chat. They will also be hosting pop up events throughout the summer so keep an eye on our socials for updates.

NatureScot will be hosting our annual Discovery Day on 14 June in Kirkgate Park, with a range of stalls and activities for everyone to enjoy. We will be inviting other organisations that we work with, so there will be plenty to learn about the Loch. The event is completely free so please don't hesitate to come along!



Keep The Light Burning



I'M ON MY USUAL lambing duties up the road. The lambing shed is about five miles from where I live, and over the last 14 years, I've done many shifts which start or finish in the early hours. During those commutes, I've often taken quiet comfort from a light, the one which used to shine from John's lambing shed at Wester Coldrain.

John ran a tidy farm and had built a lovely flock of sheep. I admired his smart, healthy fast-growing, and shapely lambs on my daylight drive-by's. He and his family worked the farm for over 50 years, they were devoted to the land and like me, brought the ewes inside to lamb, so pretty much any time I passed at night, the light was on. I didn't see John very often, but over the years, looking out for that golden glow on my journeys gave me a silent signal I wasn't alone. Knowing he too would be helping a ewe deliver or topping up a hungry lamb meant, although we never exchanged a word, we were somehow in it together, doing the same work, keeping the wheels of Scottish farming turning.

The reason I'm thinking about John's light is because this year, it's gone off. After a lifetime of farming, John has retired. And every time I pass now, I notice its absence. I hadn't expected such a small change to have such a big impact. The farm has been purchased by another neighbour and will be in very good hands, but they have a different system, so the light is not likely to be on again in quite the same way. What I'm really missing is the sense of solidarity, the invisible thread between those of us who choose to lamb inside. John's light always made me feel, 'You're not on your own.'

Of course, it's not just livestock farmers who need to stick together. At home, my husband and his brother made the most of the dry sunny spell and drilled all the barley, so they are currently spreading fertiliser and spraying to finish the job before the rain comes. They're good at supporting each other, but their patience is tested by breakdowns.

Yesterday, the sprayer needed a new solenoid, so the pre-emergence spraying came to a standstill for 24 hours until it could be sorted. And today, the fertiliser spreader has been causing issues. It's not a mechanical problem, which is usually fixable, but an unreliable electronic control box. One minute it's delivering the blend of Nitrogen, Potassium and Phosphate accurately; the next, it's too little or even too much. This sporadic spreading means some parts of the field get overloaded, while others miss out entirely. The risk with this is the barley could grow and ripen unevenly, resulting in a poor-quality grain sample.

So, this morning, when it was all getting a bit desperate, a quote for a new box was requested. An email arrived: £4500, the same price as the whole machine cost. Andrew nearly fell off his tractor seat. But he too knows the power of solidarity and made a few phone calls to his friends. Andy from Kirkness knew exactly the right things to say. In between the unprintables, I heard mutterings of 'ridiculous, far-fetched, out-of-control prices that don't match the value of the crop.' None of which makes the price any less painful, but after a while spent swapping breakdown stories, both of them felt a bit better. And that really helps. I'm sending all the best to John in his next chapter, and to the new owners of Wester Coldrain. Maybe they'll leave a light on for me occasionally.

WHAT A MONTH APRIL turned out to be. The first two weeks were glorious. I made the most of the sunshine and managed to tick off far more than expected. That early warmth gave everything a push. It made a real difference to my motivation too, being able to get outside without layers of waterproofs. The latter part of the month returned to more typical April conditions – wet and chilly – but by then I had already got a lot done.

The begonias are now well on their way. Those that were tucked up in the back bedroom have been planted into trays of damp compost and are happily growing in the heated propagator. The batch for Milnathort in Bloom is also progressing. The heated

bed in the polytunnel seems to be doing its job. I'm checking daily for signs of mildew or rot, but so far, all looking good.

The peppers and chillis have now moved from the kitchen counter into the greenhouse. They're still in small pots and will stay there until the night temperatures settle. It's tempting to move things out early when we get a sunny day, but I've learned not to trust a single warm spell. I've lost too many tender plants to a cold snap. I'm trying to stick to the plan this year.

March and April's seed sowing spree has filled the propagator and greenhouse shelves. The lisianthus, gazania and zinnia are all up. Germination was patchy in some trays, but overall better than expected. I had read that lisianthus can be tricky, so even a half tray of seedlings feels like a win. The usual suspects — cosmos, marigolds, dahlias — are coming along more predictably. Everything gets the same start: compost-filled trays, appropriate vermiculite cover, time in the propagator until germination, then into the greenhouse to grow on.

Now we're coming into May, I've started pricking out the stronger seedlings and potting them on. It's a fiddly job, but it's one of my favourites. There's something satisfying about seeing a flat tray turn into rows of tiny plants in individual pots. It's also a good chance to take stock of what's doing well and what might need a re-sow.

Outside, the tidy-up has properly begun. I made a start in April during the good weather and, drum roll please... I even power-washed the patio!! The perennials are pushing through, and it's clear which ones have survived the winter. I've started lifting and dividing some clumps that had outgrown their space. The compost bin is filling fast.

Later in the month, I'll start to harden off the summer plants. I have a plastic greenhouse thingy that I use – open during the day and closed at night. After a couple of weeks, they'll be moved onto benches outside ready for the arduous planting session(s).

It's a busy time, but a good one. Each job builds on the last, and every day outside makes a difference. If you haven't already started, it's not too late. Even just clearing a space or sowing a few seeds in a pot can be a good beginning. The garden doesn't need to be perfect. It just needs a bit of time and attention.

Here's to a productive May – and hopefully more of that good weather. See you next month.
