## MIsleading Graph?

IN THE NOVEMBER *Newsletter*, Kinross-shire Civic Trust presented a graph suggesting an alarming increase in the population of Kinross-shire over the last 20 years.


This misleading effect was achieved by failing to start the x axis at zero, a common graph trick to give an incorrect impression, despite the data being accurate.

I enclose a graph showing the correct population effect.

The figures, from the same source as used by the Civic Trust, are that the population has increased by a modest 133 people per year in the past 20 years, or 1% per year.

This is hardly the population explosion impression that the Civic Trust graph intended to give.

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## **NEW RETAIL PARK FOR KINROSS?**



PLANS ARE AFOOT FOR a new retail park to be built at the former home of British Car Auctions in Bridgend. This site at the south of Kinross has lain empty for some time and it looks as though developers have finally recognised its retail development potential.

Plans may include four outlets with a discount homeware store with adjoining garden centre, double retail unit to house two complementary supermarkets (e.g. one low cost and one high end) and a drive-through takeaway. The developers have pre-

viously completed similar sites in Aviemore and Cupar.

The developer presented local councillors and community council representatives and PKC officers with information about their previous project, and then provided a draft outline site plan for Kinross. They have not yet submitted a PAN (Pre-Application Notice).


When the PAN has been submitted the public will then be able to comment on the outline plans.

Councillor Neil Freshwater warned.


'If such an application was forthcoming, serious thought would be needed to consider things like jobs, impact on the High Street, access, and the interaction with Loch Leven including linking to the boat house car park and the loch trail. Watch this space.'

Councillor Willie Robertson said, 'One of the things I said to the developers when we met was that as part of any proposal I would want to see a new access road through the BCA site to The Pier. They promised to amend their plans to allow for this.'

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## NEW VOLUNTEER-RUN COMMUNITY BUS ROUTE FOR GLENFARG

**IN A BOLD NEW MOVE**, a local community group has set up their own weekly bus route to compensate for the lamentable lack of provision by the big transport companies.

Thursday 5 January sees the launch of the Glenfarg Community Transport Group's new weekly route linking Glenfarg to Kinross – and runs just in time for a stop at the Glenfarg Village Hall Coffee Morning!

In an attempt to provide an inclusive form of public transport offering a viable alternative to cars, whilst also improving passenger access to employment and leisure activities, the bus will run twice each Thursday between the Kinross Community Campus Library and Glenfarg Village Hall. It will include stops at Kinross Park & Ride, Loch Leven's Larder, Drunzie, Duncrievie, Mawcarse and Cuthill Towers. Timetable details are given below.

The GCTG is a not-for-profit group created in response to a need to improve transport options within

Glenfarg and surrounding areas. In October, they were granted Charitable Status (SC520068) and became full members of the Community Transport Association.

Volunteer driver training and operating costs will be part-financed by a micro-grant from the Glenfarg Community Council and an award from the PKC Cost of Living Fund. The ultimate aim is to own their own 16-seat minibus, driven by



volunteer drivers, for use by individuals and groups within the community.



## HYDRO'S £10k FUEL POVERTY GIFT TO BROKE NOT BROKEN

RUMBLING BRIDGE COMMUNITY HYDRO Society (RBCHS) has given a grant of £10,000 to Broke Not Broken to support its work on alleviating fuel poverty. RBCHS operates a hydroelectric scheme on the River Devon in Kinross-shire which provides funds from its surplus profits to benefit the local community.

Elspeth King, a Director of RBCHS commented, 'The Board of Rumbling Bridge CHS is very pleased to be able to assist Broke Not Broken in their work on fuel poverty. This grant follows on from one of £5000 we gave in April 2022. It is fitting for us as a Community Energy Society to support this crucial work in helping those affected by high energy costs.'

Annie McCormack, chair of Broken Not Broken, said, "Broke Not Broken are delighted to accept this donation of £10,000 from the Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Society to go towards energy payments for people locally experiencing fuel poverty. Being supported by a local project like this shows us a way forward that we believe is sustainable and creates the kind of Scotland we want to live in."

age and over 50% increase in fuel payments over the year so far (up until end October 2022), within Kinross-shire alone. Payments made towards energy costs total over £15,000 and the average payment made was £129. This includes not only gas and electric but also oil.

All of the charity's fuel payments are made through referral. These referrals come through a variety of channels including Health and Social Care partnerships, schools, doctors, women's Aid, SAAFA, PKC Helpline, housing departments and tenancy support through PKC, Hillcrest and Caledonia Housing Associations.

Broke Not Broken also works with The Heat Project based in Blairgowrie to give unbiased expert advice on energy, bills and how to get the most for your money. They come out to people's homes and to community groups to give one on one tailored advice. The Heat Project can then refer that household to Broke Not Broken for energy payments or items to help them save money.



## **NEWSLETTER SUPPORTS KINROSS DISABILITY SPORT OPPORTUNITIES**

PERTH & KINROSS DISABILITY Sport (PKDS) are delighted to be working in partnership with Kinross-shire ASN, Scottish Disability Sport and a number of local community sports clubs to make sport and physical activity accessible in Kinross-shire, so people of all ages with physical, sensory and learning disabilities or additional support needs can get active and enjoy the benefits that sport and physical activity brings.

PKDS Branch Coordinator, Graeme Doig explained, 'I have always been conscious of the barriers to participation faced by many people in P&K due to its large geographical size. Many people living in rural communities find it challenging to engage in weekly sports. When I got a call from Lynne McKay at Kinross-shire ASN to tell me of the lack of local opportunities for people with disabilities, it was great timing as I have been working on a project in Highland Perthshire which has



seen positive engagement with 12 community sports clubs and so far, 42 people with disabilities taking part.'

'The project aims are to work with local community clubs to shape the development of new weekly sessions for people of all ages and abilities with physical, sensory and learning disabilities or additional support needs, to encourage more people with disabilities to take part in sport and physical activity and to engage with and support local coaches and volunteers in the development and delivery of these sessions — all, at no cost to the participants.'

'I have been busy engaging with a number of local clubs and organisations in Kinross-shire over the past few weeks and everyone has been keen to get involved. Very few of the clubs tell me they have experience working with people with disabilities so this is a great opportunity to support them to be more inclusive'.

Every four weeks we will introduce a new sport session to give everyone a range of opportunities to try and to be supported to join the local club for those sports they enjoy. It's going to be a busy time and over the next few months where we will be delivering tennis, bowling, cricket, football, curling, boccia, badminton, archery, fishing, swimming, dance, fitness and more, all delivered by local coaches and volunteers in the Kinross-shire area.'



'At the end of January, we have organised Disability Inclusion Training through Scottish Disability Sport for all the coaches and volunteers involved in the project. We hope to get as many people as possible attending so we start to create a culture of inclusivity within local sporting opportunities.

'PKDS is committed to our No Cost Participation approach which sees all our weekly sessions, development and competitive events, education courses and programs delivered at no cost to the participant. For this project, we would like to thank and acknowledge the *Kinross Newsletter* for funding to make this project happen at no cost to those taking part.

Every session is open to new people of all ages to come along, give it a go and get involved. No experience is required and all equipment is provided.

## **ALTERED IMAGES**

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## **DISSENT OVER LOCH WATER QUALITY**

THERE WAS CONCERN AMONG Kinross ward councillors after a meeting to discuss issues with regard to the health of Loch Leven. In this month's *Newsletter* column (*p23*), Cllr Willie Robertson noted that the opinions given by Scottish Water and SEPA at the meeting were:

- The large increase in housing in the Loch Leven catchment hasn't really contributed to the deterioration in loch water conditions. (SEPA)
- There appear to be no records as to when untreated sewage needs to bypass the waste water plant. (SW)
- No records are kept of the amounts of untreated sewage that is discharged into Loch Leven annually. (SW)
- In any case, sewage spills into the loch are heavily diluted with flood water and filtered to remove solids. (SW)
- The increase in phosphorous entering the loch comes from agriculture. (SEPA)

He says, 'This despite 20 years of changes around water courses and the creation of field margins, buffer strips and changes to cropping practices to prevent soil run off.'

Cllr Robertson went on to say, 'Neither SEPA or Scottish Water appeared to have any concerns about another large housing allocation for Kinross-shire should this arise in Local Development Plan 3.'

Councillor Dave Cuthbert, who helped organise the meeting (and whose feature in last month's *Newsletter* on Kinross' ability to safely absorb more housing development has caused much local interest) agreed, saying there was factual information that both Scottish Water and SEPA could not supply.

He added, 'There was also confusion over whether large-scale development in



Kinross and Milnathort might be adding to the problem.'

The four councillors, Willie Robertson, Neil Freshwater, Dave Cuthbert and Richard Watters, met representatives from Scottish Water, Sepa and NatureScot in December.

Councillors' reactions were, however, mixed. Richard Watters said, 'This meeting resulted in clarifying the interacting concerns as well as positive steps toward the future. During the meeting, Scottish Water and SEPA gave updates, with some positive news from both organisations.'

According to a SEPA spokesman, 'Rainfall-driven run-off from agricultural land and farm steadings (diffuse pollution) can impact phosphorus levels in watercourses if not managed properly.

'Staff from SEPA's National Rural Unit have been visiting farms in the North and South Queich catchments since early November to identify areas of risk. All issues found are highlighted to the land manager, and appropriate timescales given for remedial action agreed, up to a maximum of 12 months. We shall continue with farm visits in the other catchments in the new year.'

Councillor Neil Freshwater said: 'The meeting was frank and useful, but there is still much concern over the extent of the problem. It is still unclear, for example, what level of environmental damage sewage is having, and how much pollution comes from other sources.'

There is still disagreement over the degree of contribution to pollution made by new Kinross housing developments.'

Attention to the issue has widened. MSP Jim Fairlie has visited the site and invited the Scottish Government Minister for the Environment Màiri McAllan to discuss the issues with him.

MSP Liz Smith has said she is 'working closely with Cllr Freshwater, who is seeking a swift resolution to this potentially damaging issue.'

The Shedders also are pleased to report a fantastic turnout of members. Things are certainly looking up!





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
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## TRACKS SEEKS YOUR HELP

## KINROSS-SHIRE KIRKS COMMIT TO WORKING CLOSELY TOGETHER

THE FOUR CHURCH OF Scotland congregations in Kinross-shire have now all formally agreed a 'Kinross-shire Parish Grouping', committing to working more closely together. The proposals had been previously agreed by the four Kirk Sessions and have now been unanimously approved at congregational meetings at Cleish, Fossoway St. Serf's and Devonside, Orwell and Portmoak, and Kinross. The proposals have now to be approved by the Presbytery of Perth.

Rev Alan Reid, minister at Kinross and currently Interim Moderator at Orwell and Portmoak, says: 'The most important part of the agreed document is the commitment to work as individual congregations only in what cannot be done together across the parish grouping.' Rev Lis Stenhouse, minister at Cleish and Fossoway, says; 'We've already identified in the document the advantages of shared working in areas such as administration, publicity, online presence, training, spe-

cial interest groups, outreach (including messy church), community engagement, pioneering and the planting of fresh expressions of church.'

The grouping will be guided by a Vision Group with representatives from each

congregation supplemented by an annual conference of all the Kirk Sessions to which other Kinross-shire churches and organisations such as KYTHE will be invited to develop areas of shared mission.

The Parish Grouping agreement is separate from, but takes account of, the longer-term proposals in the recently-approved Perth Presbytery Mission

Plan. This envisages the churches working closely together and probably ultimately become one Kinross-shire parish with a team ministry and two less church buildings by closing Cleish and Portmoak churches.

## Supporting MAF in Uganda

KINROSS PARISH CHURCH HAS completed a year-long partnership with Mission Aviation Fellowship, supporting their operations in Uganda. MAF works in many countries, using small planes to enable humanitarian and mission partners to arrive safely where overland travel is difficult or dangerous. In Uganda alone, MAF has 68 staff and six planes.

The new Country Director for MAF in Uganda, Ruth Jack, visited the Kinross church in January 2022, marking the start of the partnership. Since then, the church has raised over £2000 through various fun events and



also through its Harvest Thanksgiving collection. The church has also supported MAF in its prayers and raised awareness of the charity within Kin-

ross-shire with a MAF plane displayed at Kirkgate Park in June and a stall at the Summer Farmers' Market.

The final event was a MAFternoon Tea in the kirk as a thank you to supporters and attended by some of the MAF staff in Scotland. One of them, Andy Martin, has since written to the church thanking them for their efforts over the year: 'the folks at Kinross Parish Church have been so warm and friendly and are great encouragers. May the Lord continue to bless you as you serve at home and support many around the world.'


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## cooking with sarah rankin



## To serve two you will need:

1 lamb shank

3 sliced shallots

3 cloves of garlic, sliced

1 tsp gound cumin

1 tsp ground coriander

1 tsp garam masala

1/2 tsp allspice

1/2 tsp cinnamon

Grating of nutmeg

1 tsp plain flour

2 cloves

500ml vegetable stock

5 preserved lemons, quartered

2 sprigs rosemary

2 tbsp pomegranate molasses

Preheat oven to 140°C, Gas 1.

Brown the shank well in olive oil in an ovenproof pan and set aside.

Fry the onions and garlic in the same pan with all the spices adding a little more oil if needed. Deglaze with the stock. Make sure to scrape up all the bits from the browning, these are flavour!

Add the preserved lemons and rosemary and cover. Cook for two hours or until the meat is tender.

Remove the meat and strain off the liquid. Skim the fat from the top and whisk in 1 tsp plain flour over a low heat. Check for seasoning and add the pomegranate molasses. Shred the meat off the bone into the sauce.

Serve with couscous and top with flaked almonds, dried barberries (dried cranberries or fresh pomegranate seeds are good substitutes) and pickled shallots.



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## Councillor Willie Robertson

Loch Leven: Myself and my ward councillor colleagues had a meeting with Scottish Water, Sepa and NatureScot yesterday afternoon to discuss the ongoing issues with Loch Leven in early December. The broad outcome of the discussion was;



- The large increase in housing locally hasn't really contributed to the deterioration in the water conditions in the loch – this was from SEPA.
- There are measuring devices at the Kinross waste water treatment plant to detect when untreated sewage needs to bypass the plant but there appears to be no records as to when these events happen – this from Scottish Water.
- No records are kept as to the volumes of untreated sewage that is discharged into Loch Leven annually – Scottish Water.
- In any case sewage spills into the loch are heavily diluted with flood water and filtered to remove solids – Scottish Water (I think this is meant to reassure everyone).
- The increases in phosphorous entering the loch comes mostly from agriculture – this was from SEPA.
- Neither SEPA or Scottish Water appeared to have any concerns about another large housing allocation for Kinross-shire should this arise in Local Development Plan 3.

What I don't understand is that since the problem with algal blooms on the loch became a real issue in the late 90s farming practices around the loch have changed substantially. There are now wide field margins beside watercourses and many burns have been fenced off to prevent cattle destroying the river banks. Also quite large areas of land have been taken out of agriculture altogether and yet the problems with the loch appear to be getting worse.

The majority of the blame for the deterioration in the loch is being placed firmly on farming by SEPA. The problems with our waste water treatment plants not being able to cope during periods of heavy rainfall appear not to be a serious contributory factor. Neither does the increasing amounts of phosphorous, coming from treated sewage, as a result of housebuilding.

**Council Budgets:** The Council is currently working on the budget for the next financial year which will be agreed in February. There are major cuts in funding from the Scottish government and serious inflationary pressures that have to be dealt with. This will all lead to a reduction in services.

**Community Investment Fund:** All council wards in Perth & Kinross have a fund that is disbursed by the ward councillors in association with representatives from our community councils and local bodies. In Kinross-shire this year the fund has helped to support organisations and clubs the length and breadth of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg.

## **British Car Auction Site**

KINROSS COMMUNITY COUNCIL were contacted by London & Scottish Property Investment Management (LSPIM) with a view to making a presentation on their



plans for the former British Car Auction Site at the foot of Kinross High Street.

The Community Council arranged for P&K Councillors to attend the presentation in conjunction with a Perth and Kinross planning officer.

LSPIM explained that they were looking to place 3 retail units and a drive through take-away on the site, thereby removing the existing asbestos lined buildings.

They said that they were currently in discussions with Marks & Spencer, B&M and Lidl, although the final list might be different.

I said that I would like the site to feature a road through to the Pier, to take the traffic off the backstreets of Kinross, this was enthusiastically supported by the other Councillors present and the Community Council reps. I also asked the developer to be mindful of the residential properties adjacent to the site.

## **South Kinross Flood Protection Scheme**

Development of the site would be dependent on the South Kinross flood defences going ahead, as the site is in a flood risk area. This scheme is behind schedule, principally because of covid, however, the Flood Team tell me that they will be talking to landowners and carrying out public consultation early in 2023. The other bit of news on this is that the Scottish Government has approved the funding for this scheme.

## **Loch Leven Phosphate Meeting**

I helped organise a meeting, which was originally to consist of the four PKC Councillors plus Scottish Water. As time went by, the number of people attending steadily increased, so that the meeting had approximately 16 people attending, including the four councillors plus representatives of PKC, Scottish Water, SEPA, NatureScot and an MSP's aide.

The discussion was full and frank, with councillors outlining that they were concerned that an unknown quantity of untreated sewerage was being discharged into Loch Leven, which meant that the quality of the water in the Loch was being affected and blue green algae was being encouraged.

The discussion was wide-ranging and, at times, somewhat contradictory.

We were told that 84% of phosphate entering the Loch was from agriculture, although this number could not be verified. The frequency and quantities of untreated sewerage discharges were unknown. Scottish Water did not know if monitors were fitted to the outflows, thereby allowing the quantity of discharges to be calculated. SEPA were not sure if the license they issued, insisted on monitors being fitted, though they indicated that they should be.

There was also confusion over whether large scale development in Kinross and Milnathort might be adding to the problem. The rationale being that new developments incorporate SUDS ponds which slow the discharge of rainwater.

The meeting lasted 2 hours and it was agreed would meet again in April by which time there would hopefully be more information available.



## **Action on Climate Change**

Ever since I was first elected to Council in 2017, I have worked with colleagues to keep Perth & Kinross Council committed

www.cdp.net/en/ to learn more about CDP.



CDP's recent report monitors our environmental ambitions and gives Perth & Kinross Council a B ranking for our awareness of the potential local impacts of climate change and for our plans to address those impacts. This is an improvement from the C ranking achieved last year and up from the D ranking in 2019.

The average ranking in the Europe region is C and the average global ranking is D. The Council also received Thematic Scores of A for Adaptation and A- for Mitigation. This shows the great progress that we are making in our awareness of the climate and ecological emergency and what we intend to do to address it.

One of the actions we are taking as the Council to tackle the climate emergency is to build the new Riverside Primary School in Perth as one of the first primary schools in Scotland built to the environmentally-high Passivhaus standards.

## Action on Loch Leven

Many individuals, groups, and organisations have raised concerns about the sewage released into the Loch Leven catchment area following a period of intensive rain in early September. This added to the concerns that have already been raised about the deterioration in water quality due to increased phosphates creating harmful algae blooms around the Loch.

Responding to these concerns, all four local councillors requested a meeting with the relevant agencies, including Scottish Water, SEPA, Nature Scot, and the Council. This meeting took place early in December and resulted in clarifying the interacting concerns as well as positive steps toward the future.

Interacting with sewage and phosphates, there are three other

- Mixed sewage and surface water drains being unable to cope during downpours,
- · Diffuse pollution within the catchment area, and
- Legacy phosphates in the sediment in the loch.

And all of this interacts with the Climate Emergency impact. The rising temperature of the water in the loch and the projected increase in both frequency and intensity of downpours makes

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protecting and restoring nature and biodiversity even more challenging.

During the meeting, Scottish Water and SEPA gave updates on the work they are currently carrying out in the area and future plans for the catchment area, with some positive news from both organisations on current works and future plans.

If you want more background information about the relatively recent increase in phosphates and algae blooms around the loch, you can find it in the March 2022 issue of the newsletter, which has a good article covering the issues and the sources of phosphate around the Loch, following on from a meeting of the Loch Leven Management Group.

All these issues require joint working among all the relevant bodies and agencies, as well as our local communities. The importance of developing a holistic approach to dealing with the problem areas around the loch is imperative and having a more formal group approach, with key actions is surely a core element in reversing the environmental decline in and around the loch.

### **Action on Warm Spaces**

It was a pleasure to join locals at the Kinross and District Men's Shed as part of Perth and Kinross Council's Warm Spaces programme during the cold spell last month. The Warm Spaces have the added benefit of providing a place where people can socialise. Now with the Cost of Living crisis, the continuation of Warm Spaces is imperative.

### New Retail Park For Kinross-shire?

I HAVE SEEN PROPOSALS for a possible planning application to be submitted early next year to create a mid-sized retail park at the former BCA motor auction site at Bridgend in Kinross,



containing four outlets. Ward and community councillors met with the potential developers and PKC officers in late November. We heard about plans which could include a discount homeware store with adjoining garden centre, double retail unit to house two complementary supermarkets (e.g. one low cost and one high end) and a drive-through takeaway. The developers have previously completed similar sites in Aviemore and Cupar. The meeting was told that a Pre-Application Notice (PAN) could be submitted soon, at which point the public could comment on outline plans. If such an application was forthcoming, serious thought would be needed to consider things like jobs, impact on the High Street, access, and the interaction with Loch Leven including linking to the boat house car park and the loch trail. Watch this space.

### **Loch Leven Pollution**

LAST WEEK A MEETING with SEPA, Scottish Water, NatureScot and the four ward councillors was held in Kinross to discuss ongoing concerns about increased phosphate enrichment of Loch Leven. In particular, and as reported recently in the Kinross Newsletter, the raw sewage that is diverted into the Loch during heavy rain periods to avoid it backflowing into the clean water system. The meeting was frank and useful, but there is still much concern over the extent of the problem. It is still unclear for example, what level of environmental damage the sewage is having, and how much pollution comes from other sources such as field run-off. It is hoped that there will be a motion on the issue debated at the next full Council meeting in December. A further meeting will take place next year but all members of the Kinross-shire Local Committee are committed to a resolution.

## **Westfield Liaison Committee & Community Grants**

THE QUARTERLY MEETING OF the committee took place in Lochgelly. Most of the issues relate to the access road on PKC side of the site – and in particular ongoing delays in getting road signage installed - but there was constructive discussion with the companies involved, who are listening to community. The new community fund, which will allow organisations to the apply for grants of up to £2,000 every quarter is now open. Organisations in the Portmoak CC and neighbouring Fife CC areas can apply. Although the deadline is December for the current quarter's funding round, it was suggested a late application could be considered, and applications for the next round will start in the new year.

## Liz Smith, MSP

I AM KEEN TO start my column by updating readers of the *Kinross Newsletter* on the situation at NHS Tayside which has dominated local media over recent weeks.



In November the BBC released details of a case I have been working on for two

constituents over a period of around eight years. As many readers will have seen NHS Tayside has come under immense scrutiny for its employment of the disgraced Professor Sam Eljamel who conducted numerous botched surgeries on patients which have left some with lifelong debilitating health conditions.

Just like the constituents I have been representing over this period of time, I have tried everything to find the answers that patients deserve. But, as these answers have not been forthcoming, I am now demanding the Scottish Government establishes an independent public inquiry.

These brave campaigners — many of whom endured huge pain and suffering due to Professsor Eljamel's malpractice — have fought tirelessly to get the answers on this scandal that they need and deserve. They just want to know how Eljamel was allowed to continue practising at NHS Tayside long after evidence emerged of how appallingly negligent he was. In the days following Lucy Adam's BBC investigation more former patients have come forward to me with their own harrowing stories.

It is clear a public enquiry is the only way left that will resolve matters for the patients who have suffered in pain for such a long time. Professor Eljamel destroyed the lives of too many people and yet no one has ever been held fully accountable for what happened. His former patients deserve justice and to know the truth.

If any reader knows of anyone who has been a patient of Professor Eljamel and is willing to come forward please ask them to contact my office. The more people we have demanding an enquiry the more likely we are to finally achieve justice.

In other news I have been made aware of the discussions on the amount of untreated sewage which is being diverted into Loch Leven during times of heavy rainfall, meaning an increased pollution from phosphates. This will be highly concerning news for people across Kinross-shire who will be profoundly worried about the impact on local biodiversity. I am working closely with Councillor Neil Freshwater who is seeking a swift resolution to this potentially damaging environmental issue.

ON MONDAY 5 DECEMBER I visited Milnathort for a series of meetings to discuss important local issues. I was invited to meet with residents concerned by the development of a supermarket near Auld Mart Road to engage with locals who hold concerns about the




suitability of the site. Later, I met with organisers of the campaign group 'No Road in the Park' where a proposal was explained to me regarding a housing development that would see a road built through a popular community park. It was very interesting to hear the points of views about both of these proposals, but I stressed the importance that the decision rightly sits with elected Perth and Kinross councillors who take their time to fully consider all planning applications. I will continue to engage with these issues and listen to local voices whilst councillors make their final decisions.

A day prior to a multi-agency meeting, I visited Loch Leven alongside Councillor Richard Watters to discuss issues in relation to algae bloom. The 'eutrophication' of Loch Leven that causes these algae blooms is harmful due to its potential to grow out of control and produce toxic or harmful effects on people, marine wildlife, pets and birds. Key bodies including the Scottish Environment Protection Agency, Scottish Water, Perth and Kinross Council and NatureScot along with scientists from the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology met together to discuss ongoing work that is addressing some of the main causes. It is encouraging to hear of this work but there is still more to be done in an effort to reverse the decline in biodiversity and nature around the Loch. Following on from this meeting I have invited the Minister for Environment, Biodiversity and Land Reform to discuss the issues of rural diffuse pollution, and its impact on the loch.

In Parliament I am a member of the Rural Affairs, Islands and National Environment Committee, which is currently considering Stage 2 of the Hunting with Dogs Bill. The Bill aims to close loopholes in existing legislation that allows illegal hunting activity to persist, whilst recognising that there is a need for predators such as foxes to be controlled in certain circumstances. There is evidence in England that trail hunting is sometimes being used as a cover for illegal hunting.

As a sheep farmer and shepherd over the past 30 years prior to my election I have lived experience of the potential consequences of these proposals, and as such I agree with the general principles of this Bill. We are currently deliberating over amendments to the Bill and I am seeking to clarify the minimum number of guns that should be used by those seeking a licence for a permitted purpose. Throughout our committee meetings my aim has been to find a proportionate balance between the views of our farming communities and protecting our land environment. Foxes can cause significant damage to livestock and other wildlife such as ground nesting birds and it is important that farmers will be able to control predators in an efficient and humane manner. The Committee will continue to shape its opinion prior to Parliament as a whole voting on the Bill in the New Year.

## John Nicolson, MP

I'VE GOT MYSELF INTO a bit of trouble down at Westminster. I've been sent to the Privileges Committee for investigation – sent by a phalanx of Tory MPs, 100 Labour MPs and assorted LibDems and Ulster Unionists. I will be joining Boris Johnson in the dock. I think most people



know what he is charged with. So let me tell you why, last Tuesday, a whole afternoon was set aside to debate my case.

I'm a member of the Commons Culture Committee. Nadine Dorries, the ex-Culture Secretary gave evidence to the Committee about a Channel 4 reality series where she lived with 'real' people on a council housing scheme. She said she'd discovered the folk she lived with were actors. It wasn't true. But her claim was serious. It maligned the people concerned. And since, as Culture Secretary, she was considering privatisation, it seemed she had sought the opportunity to traduce the reputation of Channel 4. The Committee, unanimously, and cross party wrote an excoriating report about her. I sent it to the Speaker and asked that time be set aside to debate referring this serious issue to the Privileges Committee.

The Speaker replied to me. He didn't agree to my request. I reported his response by posting a video on Twitter. It attracted a lot of views. What I didn't know was that MPs aren't allowed to say they've received a letter from the Speaker or summarise its contents – even, apparently, if the letter is not marked 'private'.

Now I'm a journalist by profession. I'd never reveal a source when asked not to. Nor would I ever reveal something personal if asked to keep it private. But it seems to me there was a gulf of difference when reporting a matter of public interest. I see the latter as open democracy. The thought never crossed my mind that what I was doing broke parliamentary rules. Indeed none of the senior MPs I spoke to knew either. And the last MP to be referred to Privileges over this was, apparently, in 1937.

I am truly sorry the Speaker was deluged by a pile-on over social media when I revealed his decision. That was never my intention. I abhor abuse and try always to be courteous when using Twitter and Facebook whether I'm having exchanges with members of the public or political opponents. I did not encourage or want people to be rude to him.

I have apologised for inadvertently breaking the rule. But it's important not to be disingenuous when apologising. I believe in open democracy. I don't believe we should withhold information from constituents about Parliamentary procedures and outcomes. If I'd wanted to get the letter into the public domain secretly I could (but never would) have leaked it to a journalist. I didn't. I was quite open.

But, as *The Guardian* pointed out, I'm now in the position of finding myself reported to the Privileges Committee for revealing that Nadine Dorries – who misled a Select Committee – is not being reported to the Privileges Committee. The Committee will decide my fate in the new year.

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## WINTER HOUSEBREAKING

Although housebreaking can occur at any time of the year, during the winter months houses can give the appearance of being empty.

## **CRIME PREVENTION MEASURES**

**PERSONAL SAFE/SECURITY BOXES** Do not keep valuables at home if possible, particularly gold/jewellery/currency. Bedrooms and lofts are routinely searched during the commission of this type of crime, particularly if the occupants are celebrating a cultural festival. If a storage facility can be provided by your bank or building society then this is the best option.

**ALARM SYSTEMS** An approved monitored alarm system is recommended as an audible only alarm does not always guarantee police attendance. An audible only alarm, however, is still an effective visual deterrent. All alarm systems must be kept in good order to remain effective.

**LIGHTING** Good lighting around the outside your home is an important security feature. It increases the opportunity of criminals being seen around your home or garden.

**WINDOWS/DOORS** Many people focus on securing their front doors and forget about their windows and secondary doors in their homes. Do not leave any opportunity for a thief to enter. Always remove the key from a lock, particularly where there is glazing nearby. A less expensive method is security window film.

**INTERNAL LIGHTING** Proper use of timer switches for your home gives the impression that someone is at home. Consider placing timers hich activate at different times to add to the impression that someone is home. Leaving a radio or TV on also adds to the impression that someone is at home.

**GENERAL MAINTENANCE** Never leave tools or items that can be used by a thief to gain entry lying around the garden. Ensure shed security.

**SOCIAL MEDIA** Carefully consider what you are putting on social media, especially if you are going on holiday or attending weddings, functions or posting pictures with jewellery on full show.

**UNUSUAL ACTIVITY** Report any unusual activity to Police, either by phone (101) in person or at a police office i.e. people offering work in the area, cards being posted through the door offering to carry out work.

**CCTV** Always seek advice from an approved supplier before installing a system.

Consider **PROPERTY MARKING** items with an ultra violet pen. Check you have adequate insurance coverage. Photograph and keep an inventory of your valuables. Smaller items should be photographed next to a ruler to give scale.

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## THE CARLEITH CAIRN

JUST ALONG THE ALDIE road from Powmill Milkbar, lies an ancient Bronze Age Monument called the Carleith Cairn.

The cairn has been surveyed a number of times of the years including the Statistical Account of 1796 which states, 'On the middle of this ground, are the ruins of an old building, perfectly circular, and nearly 24 feet diameter. Not long ago, the proprietor ordered this ground to be planted, and







the stones were dug up to make a fence. When the work people were going on, they found two stone coffins near the centre. They were 4 feet long, and 3 broad, and contained to all appearance some human bones and teeth, and something resembling tallow, which went to ashes as soon as exposed to the air.

Further exploration took place in the twentieth-century but due to tree growth and the previous destruction we don't know much more. A number of people have queried as to where the remains that were found might be today but no information seems to

be on record. A bore hole for explosives can still be seen within the cairn.

Within the local folklore there is mention of a witch by the name of Meg of Aldie.

She was said to have frequented an ancient monument in the area and the cairn here at Carden certainly fits the bill.

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**IF YOU WERE TOLD** that there was an activity in which you could appear to achieve twice the effect for half the effort, would you be interested?

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## IT'S OK TO NOT LIKE DOGS

A FRIEND OF MINE confided that she gets terrified if she encounters a dog when walking through her local park. I know others who simply don't like dogs, especially those that force their enthusiastic affection on you. We have an ever increasing number of dogs in the Kinross area; for me that is heaven but I was reminded once, when my dog was seriously attacked by a dog near Kinross, that humans don't always control their dogs as well as they should. If you are not a great fan of dogs but understand that we live in a community where compromise is the answer, I want to offer you ways to minimise unwanted affection and maximise your sense of safety.

Ditch the idea that you have to say hello to a friend's dog. Many will thank you for not making eye contact, smiling and speaking to their dog (you've just invited the dog to jump up on you), allowing them to keep their dog calm.

Never stroke a dog on a lead unless you know them and they have had time to consider their choices and come to you. A dog on a lead is trapped. If you surprise them or approach them they may have no choice but to use aggression to make you back off. They only want to create distance. The same goes for dogs in cars. You'd be mad to put your hand in to say hello; how will they make that hand go away if they don't want it? They are entitled to protect their personal space, just like you would if a stranger got handsy with you.

Interpret what you see. A dog with a stiff body, staring at you or your dog, with head low and tail high and twitchy is one you hope the owner interrupts pretty soon. However, if the whole body is fluid and relaxed you are usually safe. Dogs with waggy tails are not always happy, again it is whether the tail is wagged high and stiffly, or mid-way and relaxed.

Fold your arms. Speak the dog's language — body language. Folding arms and turning your head away from the dog, avoiding eye contact, tells them you don't want to interact. This tip is hugely successful at deflecting their attention from you.

Stand totally still if needed. Dogs can't see things that are perfectly still (that's why they stop and crouch sometimes, to make themselves unnoticeable while choosing whether to interact). Being up wind helps too. Yet fast mov-



ing things become very clear to dogs so don't be surprised if they want to join in if you run (running and squealing even better).

Trust that dogs off lead are safe. There's a lot of very decent dog owners around here who never let a dog who has injured another dog or human off the lead (and sometimes muzzled) until they are completely rehabilitated. A decent owner will also not let their dog run up to yours if your dog is on a lead. If you get a scallywag bothering your dog whilst it is on lead, keep walking, stride your dog out of the situation – its more stressful for your dog if you stop.

My dog is only trying to get a laugh when she walks right in front of someone charging on minding their own business, but it's downright annoying so I watch her body language for 'intent' and interrupt it (I can show you dog owners what I mean by that if you wish).

Kinross' outside spaces should forever be a place where dogs have the opportunity to be off lead, so they can learn manners and respond instantly when they are called (99% of the time. No dog or owner is perfect). You are right to expect dogs off lead to be under control and if not, there to be an authority who will do it instead.


If you or your dog are unlucky enough to be injured (or have reasonable and justified fear that you will be, as you don't need to be injured to prosecute) both the Police and Dog Warden (Animal Welfare Officer) have a duty to act. Don't let them tell you otherwise or their reluctance to put you off. The AWO deals with injury to dogs, the Police both but usually just humans.

I hope I haven't spooked all you dog owners too much. We do have a responsibility to help our dogs fit in with the community and be socially acceptable. In addition to me, there are other great dog trainers around using modern methods who are worthy of your investment. If we dog lovers refresh our dogs' manners in order to enjoy the freedom of our communal areas safely I hope you will now feel better informed to keep yourself feeling safer in the company of our beloved dogs.

## WEATHERMAN WILLIE



**KINROSS' VERY OWN** Willie Wilson has been providing the *Newsletter* with weather reports for as long as the *Newsletter* has existed. We visited him and his wife Rita, at their home to find out more.

Willie caught his first fish when he was only 8 years old and landed his first job at Kinross fishery in 1962. His father, a game-keeper on the Kinross estate, lived in the house where Willie still



lives today – although now with his own wife Rita, to whom he has been married for 55 years. Rita grew up on a farm in Cleish and would milk the cows by hand before and after school, in those days a two-mile journey by foot.

As a boy, Willie would go out in the fishing boat with two men and a strokeman. In 1960 there was a record season in fishing with a total catch of 86,000 fish. At that time fishing was prolific on the loch and he remembers up to 52 boats being out at any one time. The loch was heavily populated with perch and brown trout but while this is still the case, angling is now mostly for sport rather than for sustenance.

Upon turning 15, he was allowed to row a boat and join the 60 or so men at the pier every morning, but he was not allowed to

join in with the 'tossing schools'. These were highly illegal open air gambling sessions, where men bet on the toss of two coins, while the youngest boys kept a strict lookout for the local police!

Every day, rain or shine, Willie takes weather and temperature measurements for the MET Office. He takes us outside to see the equipment he uses, set up in his garden. Rainfall is measured in a tube and the amount recorded in a notebook, and sunlight is measured using a 'sun card'. The sunshine recorder concentrates sunlight through a glass sphere onto a recording card placed at its focal point. The focus shifts as the sun moves, and a burn trace is left on the card. The length of the burn trace on the card represents the sunshine duration.

Willie also measures water quality in Loch Leven. Even as a youth Willie recalls seeing algae in the loch, but while he happily swum in the water in those days he says the algae has increased to such an extent that he wouldn't dream of doing so now. The algae, he says, have a 17°C trigger point and year on year are arriving earlier and lasting longer than ever before.

Water quality is measured with a Secchi disc, (created in 1865 by Angelo Secchi) a plain white circular disk, 30cm in diameter, used to measure transparency or turbidity in bodies of water.





The disc is mounted on a pole or line, and lowered slowly down in the water. The depth at which the disk is no longer visible is taken as an indicator of the transparency of the water, the Secchi depth. Water opacity is not easy to measure and is to some extent, subjective. The quality of the water is of great concern at the moment, and desperately needs remedied. The last upgrade to the waste water treatment plant was made over 40 years ago.

Despite the increasing algal blooms, Willie says of the loch that he just 'Can't leave it alone!' and that he has the 'greatest respect for Loch Leven, which is the most wonderful freshwater site he has ever encountered.' Willie once discovered a pearl from a shell at the side of the loch, so Loch Leven really does hold treasures deep within. He believes that housing, farming and climate change all play a part in the changing nature of the loch.

Like many, he can remember when the loch completely froze over and it was possible to walk right across to Loch Leven Castle across the ice, and has been involved in rescuing a fair few folk that got themselves into difficulty doing just that.

The conversation turns to the huge and diverse colony of birds in the loch and what the most interesting specimen was that he had ever seen there. He recalls that 35 years ago some pink flamingoes escaped from a private collection in Scotland and came to live on the loch. At first sight the fishermen thought they had had one too many whiskies the night before, but soon realised they were not seeing things. The birds were hardy brutes and survived, and raised young, staying at the loch for a few years!

# FRILUFSLIV – SCANDINAVIAN WISDOM FOR WINTER BLUES

LET'S FACE IT, JANUARY is grim for most of us. The festivities are over, maybe we have returned to the daily commute and our bank balance is a touch worse for wear, made all the harsher by the recession this year. We wake up in the dark and return in the dark and sometimes the grey clouds barely seem to rise above the trees. To make matters worse it is often cold, damp and dreary outdoors. It's no wonder then that so many of us in Scotland suffer from winter blues or even Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). I have lived with low mood in winter all my life - well, as far back as my teenage years anyway. Some years this has tipped into real depression which has lasted well into spring and other years it has been better. Like all mental illness it is complex but I suspect most of us are affected in some way in the winter. Naturally we have less energy and resilience at this time of year but our society expects us to carry on as normal with all the usual commitments and stresses. Inevitably this can take its toll. Over the years I have found many ways to take care of my mental health through the winter and have happily found more acceptance of it, but I can't be complacent as I can never really tell how it will go until it's over.

What helps me? Reducing stress, not taking on as much as I would in spring or summer. Resting more, yoga nidra (a type of guided relaxation) is my rest of choice. Spending as much time as I can outdoors, especially when the sun is out. Sitting in front of a daylight lamp for about 20-30mins a day. Giving into the atmosphere of winter, reading by the fire wrapped up in a blanket for example. Savouring simple joys, the beauty of a winter's sunset or a warm cup of coffee in my hands. Feeling isolated and alone is a real risk with low mood so I make a special effort to meet up with friends, especially when I feel this way. Being honest and open with my family, reminding them each September is never easy but normally by January we are in a flow. Herbal remedies such as St John's Wort (not suitable for everyone) have also helped me as well as talking therapies from time to time.

We messed about with ropes for a bit, but couldn't find a place for attachment. Then with a stroke of genius, she said that she would nudge me out backwards. So, she nosed up to my car and pushed me out a little, and then went round to the backend, and pushed me forwards out of my dilemma. So I set out on my way again, with gratitude in my heart, delighting that my angel was an inventive friend with a four-wheel drive.

My Milnathort friend, Lucille Henderson, and I used to run workshops for groups, which we called 'Change Your Mind for a Change'. I have to admit that we thought we really could persuade people to change their minds, in order to see the world from a different perspective. Easier said than done. It's much harder to get an old idea out of your head, than it is to get a new one in! But with that in mind, I offer you a few suggestions that might just land as the days grow longer, and we gradually emerge blinking into the spring.

### **CHANGE YOUR MIND FOR A CHANGE**

- **Gratitude:** Think of 3 things that you are grateful for before you get out of bed.
- **Praise:** Notice people who are doing something well, and tell them. Make someone's day by noticing their hair, a smile or a kind act. You will be amazed at the results.
- Take Time: to just be with your family or friends. No TV, mobiles or emails. The other things can wait, but precious moments are beyond value and can be created.
- Forgive: Life is too short to harbour bad feelings. It does whoever you are forgiving good, but it does you far more good. It is the emotional equivalent of weight loss. Unforgiveness sits around your heart like a stone.

- Choose Your Attitude. The minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed and signed off with an amendment that whilst there had been a discussion of the possible provision of a crossing and absence of paths, the main concern of Carnbo residents was to continue to stress that the speed reductions promised for March 2002 and other mitigation measures have still not been implemented and to try and establish when they might be.

### **Matters Arising**

### Road Safety in FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo)

PKC have provided the CC with a list of outstanding work in Kinross-shire. Following discussion at the last meeting the CC have proposed a matrix to categorise the work and used this to prioritise the list provided. The prioritised list was made available at the meeting for CCIIrs and MoP, who were asked to mail any comments to the CC.

The CC wrote to PKC officials on 10 November complaining about the lack of information on the timeline for delivering agreed road safety measures, especially in Carnbo, and has received no response. Members of the CC, along with other Kinross shire Community organisations, will attend a meeting with PKC CEO Thomas Glen and Senior Executives on 13 December and personally raise this with them. CCllr Bruce-Jones noted that this issue was also mentioned at the Kinross-shire Local Area Committee. Cllr Cuthbert had shared with Kinross-shire CCs PKC's Member Briefing Note containing a prioritised programme of Vehicle Activated Sign actions. Regrettably this list does not include any in our areas, in spite of our frequent requests.

A Carnbo resident expressed thanks to the CC for their continued efforts to try and escalate these issues.

A MoP had raised concerns with the CC on the speed of traffic going through Crook of Devon. CCllr Duffy had responded and invited them to volunteer for our Community Speed Watch project.

CCIIr Bruce-Jones noted that the absence of a VOSA check point on the A977 and A91 is why the goods vehicles use them, and perhaps this would be the only effective solution.

### **Drum Flooding**

Cllr Freshwater said that PKC haven't supported community ditch clearing programmes since 2013 when the funding was removed. CCllr Bruce-Jones replied that Scottish Water had indicated that they might help fund a programme.

### **Community Development Trust**

Members of the CDT met on 19 November at Blairingone School to start clearing the inside of the building.

### **Crook and Drum Growing Together**

The first stage of the community orchard: planning native pollinator-friendly plants and native daffodils, has been completed. The next stage of planting trees will be done in March.

### **Seamab School Floodlights**

At the last meeting of this CC a MoP raised concerns about floodlights being continuously lit at Seamab School, the CC contacted the school and a local resident also pointed out that fundraisers may not be too impressed by the money being wasted. The lights are now switched off outside normal hours.

Matters arising with no update since last meeting: Fossoway Area Transport, Noise disturbance linked to play areas at Fossoway Primary School, Community Speed watch, Blairingone War Memorial.

### Consultations

There are three consultations still open for the public to comment on, and one new one:

On 14 November 2022, Epower Ltd on behalf of Brunt Hill Ltd (the Applicant) submitted a request for a scoping opinion from the Scottish Ministers for the proposed Brunt Hill Wind Farm. The application area covers forests including Innerdouny Hill, North Hill and Black Hill located approximately 5km North of Carnbo and 4.5km north-west of Kinross. The proposal is for up to 26 wind turbines with an estimated blade tip height of 220 metres, and associated infrastructure. The CC has been asked by the Scottish Government to respond to this request and comments are due by the 9 Jan 2023. At the request of Carnbo residents the details will be sent to them, and a combined response will be discussed in detail at the next CC meeting. ### **New Business**

There is a call for the setting up of a paths group in Fossoway. There is money, help and equipment for loan available. This would be a group that keeps paths open to the public by cutting back vegetation and generally improving accessibility of our walkways. Would anyone (public or CC) be interested in taking the lead on this? Cllr Robertson can explain the details. The cycle path from Aldie Road to Drum and the 'Walk Around

### Community Council News

Lovely Crook' both have overgrown vegetation and would be good candidates for such a group.

PKC has notified the CC of Holiday waste and recycling arrangements. The flyer will be added to Facebook.

A MoP shared with the CC a letter from RTS Forestry including a scoping proposal for new woodland at Barnhill. The 32.5 hectare site will be mostly diverse conifers with some native broadleaf species.

### Community Council Business – Meetings Attended

CCIIr Bruce-Jones attended the Kinross-shire Local Area Committee meeting, at which the following items were discussed. **Road safety:** Particular emphasis to be made on outstanding projects within the area due to lack of human resources. CCs were asked to submit their top three priority items for their area from PKC's list of outstanding projects.

**Blairingone School:** PKC are supportive of the proposal for the CDT to acquire it.

**Proposed Constituency Boundary Changes:** PKC's position is that they should be left as they are.

**Presentation by CATCH Loch Leven** regarding renewable energy and sourcing heat from the Loch.

**Serviced employment land** is needed in Kinross shire to create job opportunities – this will be included in LDP3.

**Kinross Common Good Fund:** Grants have been made to 'Light Up Kinross' and to residents for a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. It was suggested that applications be made for local pop-up cops. Next meeting will be in January.

CCIIr Cheape attended a meeting of the Kinross Fund yesterday evening – there was only one grant application and £5000 was awarded to the Milnathort Guide Hall towards renovation of the roof.

### **P&K Councillors' Reports**

**Neil Freshwater:** Cllr Freshwater noted that the Budget process was under way, which prompted the CC to ask Cllr Freshwater if there would be any publication of results from the survey into PKC's budget choices, and he undertook to find out.

Grant applications to the Community Investment Fund are currently being reviewed. Hopefully the application for Speed Watch equipment will be approved.

There is a proposal to create a retail park in Kinross.

### **Planning Applications**

22/01842/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at land 160 metres north east of Solsgirth House, Solsgirth. No CC Comment 22/01695/FLL Erection of 2 holiday accommodation units at land 15 metres north west of lvy Cottage, Gartwhinzean Road, Powmill. Ivy cottage is the, until recently derelict, single storey cottage on the A977 in Powmill which has now been restored. No CC Comment.

### **Planning Decisions**

22/01009/IPL Erection of a dwelling house and garage (in principle) at land 35 metres south west of Tethyknowe House, Blairingone. The application was refused; the CC had made a neutral comment.

22/01010/IPL Erection of a dwelling house (in principle) at land 40 metres south east of Tethyknowe House, Blairingone. The application was refused; the CC had made a neutral comment. 22/01240/FLL Extension to dwelling house and formation of decking at 5 Drummond Park, Crook of Devon, Kinross. The application was approved; the CC had made no comment.

21/01755/FLL Erection of three dwelling houses, three garages and associated works at land 30 metres north east of Rantrie Knowe, Drum. Three residents from Drum made representations at the Planning Committee, on the grounds of increased flooding and that the land is still contaminated. The Officers stated that the new SUDS was designed to capture all

extra water and would slowly release it into the burn. PKC Cllrs accepted this argument and unanimously voted to accept the application. The CC had also objected on the same grounds.

22/01599/FLL Alterations and extensions to dwelling house at High Station, Rumbling Bridge, Kinross. The application was approved; the CC had made no comment.

### **Local Review Board**

21/00001/FLL S42 application to delete condition 6 (access upgrade) of permission 20/01319/FLL at land 180 metres south west of Powmill Cottage, Rumbling Bridge.

The applicant had proposed that he should only be required to upgrade the road in front of his plot and not the entirety of Craigton Farm Lane as per S42 condition 6. The CC had objected to this as there would be no guarantee that owners of the other plots would also upgrade the road in front of their houses and this would not be done together. Nor would there be any passing places created. The appeal was upheld by a majority of PKC Cllrs.

### **CC Planning Objections**

At the last meeting of this CC, Cllr Cuthbert informed us about a new rule recently passed by the Council, which would direct applications directly to the Planning Committee if there was a material planning objection from a CC. This rule is now active, as it has been approved by the Scottish Government as a change to delegation rules.

### **Development of LDP3**

CCIIrs Duffy and Marchant attended a meeting with PKC where they discussed the development of LDP3 and PKC's Big Conversation programme. It has been agreed that the CDT will work with the CC to engage the Fossoway District in the development of Local Place Plans which will then be registered with PKC to inform the development of LDP3. This will be supported by PKC.

CCIIr Marchant described the new National Planning Framework 4 which sits above individual Council LDPs, and hence its contents will take precedence over PKC's LDP and Policies.

### Correspondence

PKC's Leadership Team, including the Chief Executive, will hold their regular meeting in Kinross in December. The CC had been invited to attend – CCllrs Marchant and Duffy have accepted the invitation.

### **AOCB**

**Drummond Park Adoption:** Mike Barnacle is meeting residents to review some issues. CClr Farquhar reported that the Crook Moss site merits improvement to the embankment area – Could the Bloom group do this?

The hedge at Muckhart has now been cut, although the Muckhart CC never replied to this CC's emails.

The next meeting of Fossoway and District Community Council will be on Tuesday 3 January 2023 in Crook of Devon Village Hall

# Cleish and Blairadam CC News from the October Meeting

The Chair recorded that we're all very saddened to hear of the sudden death of Nigel Robertson. He was a very active member of the Community Council for many years. He will be missed by the Community and his input to the Community Council will be missed.

### Police Report

PC Ben Sampson was unable to attend, so PC Arthur, PC McWilliam stood in to report on Community Policing.

### **Speeding**

Community Officers and Response Officers in the area are aware of the complaints and regularly get out to check the area. In addition, Traffic Officers from Perth are patrolling the area and have issued multiple traffic tickets in recent months. These Officers will continue to patrol the area going forwards. Concerns were raised by the prevalence of speeding by delivery vans in the area, and this appears to be a common experience across the whole area.

### **Police Engagements**

Last month, the Community Police Officer visited Cleish Primary School to engage with the children and staff around road safety.

### **Coffee with a Cop Events**

These have proved popular in other areas, so are being offered locally as an opportunity for the public to engage with Police Officers informally, ask questions and raise any issues or concerns.

### Speed Watch

There was some interest in resurrecting this programme as it has been in abeyance since the merger of the separate Police forces into Police Scotland. Previously purchased equipment was absorbed when Police Scotland was created, so communities would need to seek funding to purchase the necessary equipment. The attending Police Officers confirmed that the community Speed Watch programmes were effective when they were operating.

### Correspondence

### **Community Investment Fund Scheme**

This was identified as a potential source of funding for a projector and screen to enable a better experience when hosting hybrid Community Council meetings where we have a combination of in-person and remote attendance. Community Council will approach this scheme for funding for this purpose.

### Till Hill

Community Council has submitted a request to Till Hill for the Community Council to be considered as a stakeholder in their long-term forest plan. The Forrest Plan governs the future management of the forest and is coming up for renewal; the plan covers areas such as felling, planting, drainage, community access.

Having the Community Council as a recognised stakeholder in this plan will allow us to represent the views of the community as this plan is developed.

### **Gairney Plantation**

A question was raised regarding this plantation which was felled around six years ago and was meant to be replanted but has not been planted nor has it mean managed in the intervening time. Cllr Neil Freshwater took an action to follow up in this.

### Rules, clarification, nominations for the CC / Elections

Sean Gordon, Charles MacLaren, Francis Principe-Gillespie, Margaret Traylor, Fred Whalley have been elected to the CC for the next term, and this leaves us with three vacancies where the CC will seek to co-opt additional members. The co-opting process cannot start until 6 months after the election.

### **Planning Objections**

Cllr Dave Cuthbert highlighted that at the last full Council meeting a new process was approved that means if a Community Council objects to a planning application, this will automatically trigger referring that application to the full planning committee. This was welcomed by the CC as a recognition of the relevance of the role of the CC as a strong voice to represent the view of the local community.

### **Road Safety**

There are approximately 877 outstanding areas of work in the local area relating to road safety, so the Council is looking for assistance from the Community Councils in helping to prioritise these areas of work based on local knowledge. This would include areas like the cutting of verges on corners, potholes and clearing of road gullies.

### **Broadband Update**

### **Blairadam Area**

Sean Gordon reported that the Local Community Fibre Project has received a quote from Openreach for the 67 properties in the Keltybridge area, and that the next stage was to challenge the Openreach assessment of the existing line speeds for most of the properties in the area to ensure that we have sufficient funding from the Scottish Government Broadband Voucher Scheme to fund the entire project. This work is underway, but the process of proving that the Openreach data is incorrect is extremely slow. Working with Andrew Mitchell from Scottish Government we have for example successfully challenged the line speeds of every single property in Middleton Park and had all these challenges accepted, so we are hopeful of being able to move this project forwards to the next stage with Openreach and Scottish Government funding.

### **Financial Update**

Draft Statement of accounts has been issued for audit, with the current balance being £395.56

### **Planning**

**Hillview, Kinnaird.** Application approved – Change of use from open space to form extension to garden ground, access and parking in retrospect.

**Land 100 metres NE of Blair Fordel Farm.** Application refused. Siting of two static caravans or welfare storage use, erection of an animal shelter and associated works in part retrospect.

**The Willows Blairforge.** Application refused. Change of use from agricultural land farm extension to garden ground interaction garden buildings. In retrospect.

Residential development 140 metres in northeast of the bungalow Benarty Rd. There is an in-principle application to build a housing development on the site of the colliery along the road to Loch Ore Country Park.

CC will request a Development Brief from the developer to understand how the developer plans to protect the amenity of the area.

**2 dwelling houses southwest of 14 Main St, Keltybridge.** Application to erect two tall, narrow houses on a restricted site and next to listed buildings and various other single-story building in Keltybridge. This has so far had 16 objections from local residents. The Community Council has objected to this application.

Siting of an accommodation unit at Blairfordel Farm. This was a temporary consent (now expired) for a caravan for a farm worker. The new application is for a permanent accommodation unit on the same site on the edge of the farmyard.

### **Blairadam**


Ongoing problems with cars and trucks parting on the pavements in Keltybridge, where there is damage to multiple parts of the pavement.

### Cleish

**Update on the school:** There was supposed to be an interim project to improve the facilities in the existing building which has not happened so far. Cllr Neil Freshwater is going to follow up on this issue.


### Tuesday 17 January, Fossoway and the River Devon





We begin the New Year with a zoom get together to share members pictures. Those of us who have been busy with our cameras during last few weeks and throughout the Christmas and Hogmanay



Portmoak Community Woodland Group added to the Christmas spirit by offering mulled juice and hot chocolate,





### Miller Homes appeal need for EIA

The Trust is disappointed that Miller Homes has appealed to the Scottish Government Planning and Environmental Appeals Division over the need to carry out an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for their proposed housing development north west of Davies Park in Kinross.

Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) had carried out a 'Screening

Opinion' which concluded that an EIA is necessary.

The development is clearly a 'Schedule 2' development under the the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) (Scotland) Regulations 2017, in that it is an urban development on an area exceeding 0.5 hectares. In addition it is in a 'sensitive' area in that it is in the catchment of Loch Leven, which is a 'Special Protection Area'.

An EIA is required if such a proposed development is likely to have 'significant effects on the environment' by virtue of factors such as its nature, size or location. PKC decided that it is likely. We await the Scottish Government's decision on whether this will be overruled.





# NatureScot Loch Leven NNR



HAPPY NEW YEAR! We hope you've all made the most of the festive period and are positive about the year ahead. Things are still ticking away at Loch Leven NNR and the nature at this time of year can often get us through January, not least helping us shed the Christmas pounds! There are always natural treats to be found here, even on the dreichest of days. Leafless trees provide great birdwatching and many of our residents like bullfinch (who can often be seen together as Mr and Mrs) with their poignant 'peu' call can be spotted feeding on the last of the seed-heads. Kirkgate Cemetery can be an excellent spot to immerse yourself in passerine birdsong which is soon to start up again. Our resident population of heron on castle Island will be starting to pair up and re-build and repair their nests. Heron are early nesters, and in some years, we have had over 30 pairs on Castle Island, but the recent cold snaps in February have seen their numbers drop in the last two years. Let's hope for a productive January so these magnificent birds can get a good start to their breeding season!

Loch Leven is like a box of chocolates — you never know what you're going to get! Our Phoenix Hide and viewing screen make excellent waterbird-viewing vantage points. We can still have incredible numbers of some species like coot at this time of year and many ducks are already gearing up for the mating season. Male mallards are beginning to bob their bottle-green heads in the hopes of impressing the females. Drake goldeneye have adopted a different technique of head-bobbing which has over 14 different names. The commonest of these is for him to bend his triangular head back

to his rump, thrust it forward again and kick his feet up – truly bizarre behaviour! Territorial disputes are not far away either – make sure to have a look for male swans dressed in their best whites, fending off potential challengers.

With this being my first winter at Loch Leven, I'm certainly hoping it'll be a snowy one. It's quite possible at this time of year to have substantial ice cover across the loch. This can be good for our diving ducks in that the water level is lower, allowing them to find food easier, but it can make our bird counts very tricky indeed. Often hundreds of birds will be floating in one amorphous raft and breaking them down in to species isn't for the faint-hearted!

Keep your eye out for the year's first faint splashes of colour – there is always something hidden amongst the frosty ground. The promise of spring always keeps me going at this time of year, even if at times it can seem an age away!

We have a number of regular and new seasonal events on throughout this coming year. Keep an eye on the blog (Loch Leven WordPress), Loch Leven NNR Facebook page and the Loch Leven NNR Instagram to make sure you hear all about it. Here's to 2023!

# **Cow Commitment**

WHEN I HEARD THERE was to be an extra issue of our beloved *Kinross Newsletter*, I admit I let out a wee groan, how would I meet a December deadline in amongst everything else that is going on in the run up to Christmas? I confided this to some friends, they are all farmers' wives and whilst I expected a bit of sympathy, I got none of it! Over our festive lunch they informed me of the havoc caused by the cold snap, the automatic milk bar for the calves which took a great deal of thawing out and the frozen pipes to defrost to quench the thirst of their cattle, they also reminded me (a lowly sheep farmer) that cows need milked every day. The ladies are a nurturing bunch so encouraged me to crack on with a hard-hitting piece on the realities within the farm yard at this hugely busy time of year. It's a challenge I have accepted and I hope I can do it justice.

The first thing to explain is that most beef and dairy animals are housed in livestock buildings from November to April, this is purely due to the weather conditions in most of Scotland that mean the fields are very wet so it's not possible to keep them outside and expect them to either endure pregnancy, thrive and grow or produce milk. So they come inside and once that happens they are entirely, 100 percent reliant

on the farmer to provide them with everything they require to live a good life. On these farms the average herd size could be between 100-150 cows, their offspring will also be housed plus the previous years offspring getting near to finishing and maybe some bought in cattle too. So up any farm lane in this area, there could easily be 500 mouths to feed twice a day, 500 animals to ensure have clean drinking water, 500 to bed up and keep clean, 500 to keep an eye on. 'That's the art

of stockmanship,' comments one of my friends, 'spotting an animal that isn't quite itself is vital, so it can then be treated quickly and nurtured back to good health.'

With such large herds, the farmers use machinery to make the day-to-day process as straightforward as possible, so a typical routine will be to feed the growing animals a cereal ration both morning and night, silage bunkers will be filled up daily with straw bedding topped up a few times a week. Some places use a mixer wagon to deliver a formulated super mix, the cattle love this and are known to be very contented when fed in this way. 'Happy cattle are healthy cattle,' she adds.

This routine is not exceptional I suppose, maybe not that newsworthy even but let's stop to think about this a bit further. It's seven days a week for nearly six months of the year, all year round if the cows are milked. And in Kinross-shire where many farms are run by the family, there is no outside help, no relief workers, no holiday cover, no agency staff to call in. If one of the family has a day off then it is another member that takes over that job and adds it to their own duties. The word for this is relentless and the farmers devotion to it day in day out is what sets them apart. Two of the husbands have farmed all their lives and been involved in milking cows since they were young boys themselves, it turns out neither of them have ever missed a Christmas Day milking, that's over 50 years service. 




